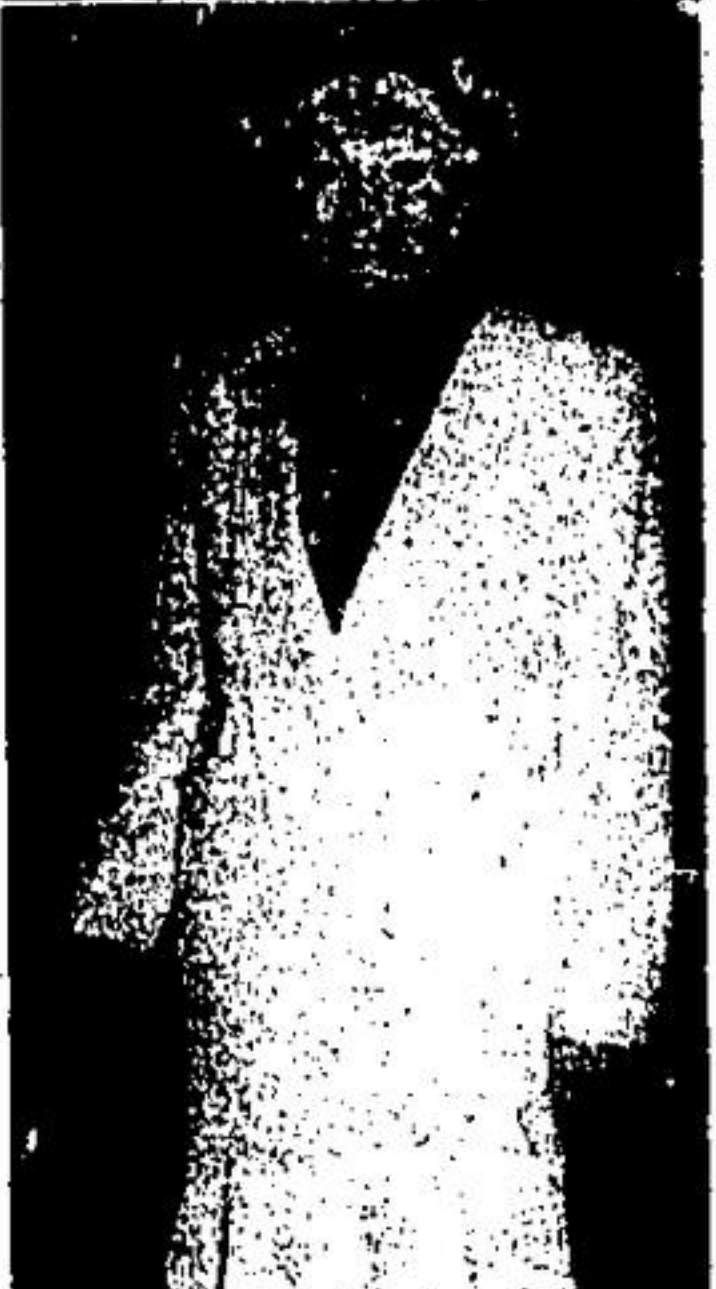


Dandy designs

Mountainview study yet to be completed

The noise study looking at traffic noises along Mountainview Road from Steeles Avenue to Campbell Gate isn't complete nor to the liking of the town engineer.

Monday night, councillors were brought up to date on the status of various studies required of Enterac Property Corporation in connection with the Georgetown South development.

Engineer Bob Austin said he has received a draft report of the noise study by Barman, Coulter, Swallow Associates, but that was some time ago. The study was not complete nor to Mr. Austin's satisfaction.

As for the noise and odor study on the Georgetown Water Pollution Control Plant, the same firm was to do it.

"To my knowledge, no report has yet been filed by Barman, Coulter, Swallow Associates, however a report has been filed by Senes Consultants Limited in draft form," Mr. Austin said. He added he approves

the work to date, and Regional staff will be looking at the study in greater detail.

As for the traffic impact study, a draft interim report from Barton, Aschman Associates Limited has been received. The text and maps have to be completed as only the field work has been done so far, Mr. Austin said.

A master drainage report on how stormwater is to be handled on the property is being prepared by R.E. Cliphams Limited and has yet to be finalized, Mr. Austin said.

The geotechnical investigation analyzing the stability of the Silver Creek valley slope and how to minimize erosion on abutting lots has been done by Terraprobe Limited, and the study was accepted by Mr. Austin in October. The same firm has also provided a geotechnical report on the design of pavement structure for roadways in the proposed subdivision. Mr. Austin accepted it in October.

Milne named to top post

Ross Milne, Brampton's former Liberal MP, is now national organization chairman for the Liberal Party of Canada.

Mr. Milne was elected chairman of one of the federal party's three standing committees at the national policy convention on the weekend.

As chairman of the organization committee, the former Peel-Dufferin-Simcoe MP will be directing much of the party's efforts to prepare for the next general election. He defeated one other candidate, an Ottawa-area delegate, for the committee job.

In a campaign speech to the convention delegates, Mr. Milne warned the next election could be just 500 days away and the party must begin immediately for preparations to challenge the strong party organization the ruling Progressive Conservatives have had in position for the past several years.

He told the 2,600 voting delegates the party must give the highest priority to the next election if it is to win control of Parliament back from the Tories.

But all the while he was campaigning for the influential post, Mr. Milne was aware he will have a more difficult task than his predecessor who chose not to seek re-election.

BRAZIL NUT SLICES

- 1 cup brazil nuts
- 1 cup butter or margarine
- 2 1/2 cups sifted all purpose flour
- 2 tsp. baking powder
- 1/4 tsp. baking soda
- 1/2 tsp. salt
- 3/4 tsp. ground cinnamon
- 1/2 cup granulated sugar
- 1/2 cup lightly packed brown sugar
- 2 eggs, well beaten
- 1 tsp. vanilla
- 1/4 tsp. almond extract

Slice brazil nuts. Measure butter or marg. into a heat-proof bowl; place over hot water until just melted; remove from heat.

Sift flour, baking powder, baking soda, salt and cinnamon together 3 times. Stir sugars into melted butter or margarine. Add well-beaten eggs a little at a time, combining thoroughly after each addition; mix in vanilla, almond extract and brazil nuts. Add flour mixture to sugar mixture part at a time, combining thoroughly after each addition.

Shape dough into cylinders about 2" in diameter and wrap in waxed paper. Chill overnight. Next day grease cookie sheets. Preheat oven to 350°. Cut chilled dough into 1/8" thick slices and arrange, slightly apart, on prepared cookie sheets. Bake about 8 minutes, until golden brown. Makes 9 doz.

Separate school trustees depart

Thursday night, the Halton Board of Education said goodbye to the four separate school trustees on the Board.

At the end of December Halton Hills/Milton Trustee Don Gordon, Oakville Trustee Paddy Hughes and Burlington Trustee Bill Priestner and Jim Hourigan will no longer sit on the public Board. The change will be effective in January, 1987, as stated in Bill 30, the extended funding bill.

With the loss of the four separate school trustees, the Board will have 16 trustees. The loss of the four will mean more work, particularly committee work, for the remaining trustees, Chairman Arlene Bruce said.

The loss of the one trustee representing north Halton should not hurt northern representation at the Board, because the south lost three trustees, Chairman Bruce said. The loss will be felt throughout the region, she said.

"They (separate school trustees) are a pretty dedicated group."

Trustee Priestner has been with the Halton Board since it formed in 1969. He was the first separate school trustee in Ontario ever to become chairman of a public board. It was a controversial appointment at the time (in the mid-1970s), Chairman Bruce said.

The Board will miss having another lawyer on the Board, now that Trustee Hourigan is leaving. Former Mayor of Milton, Don Gordon, and veteran Trustee Paddy Hughes will also be missed, Chairman Bruce said.

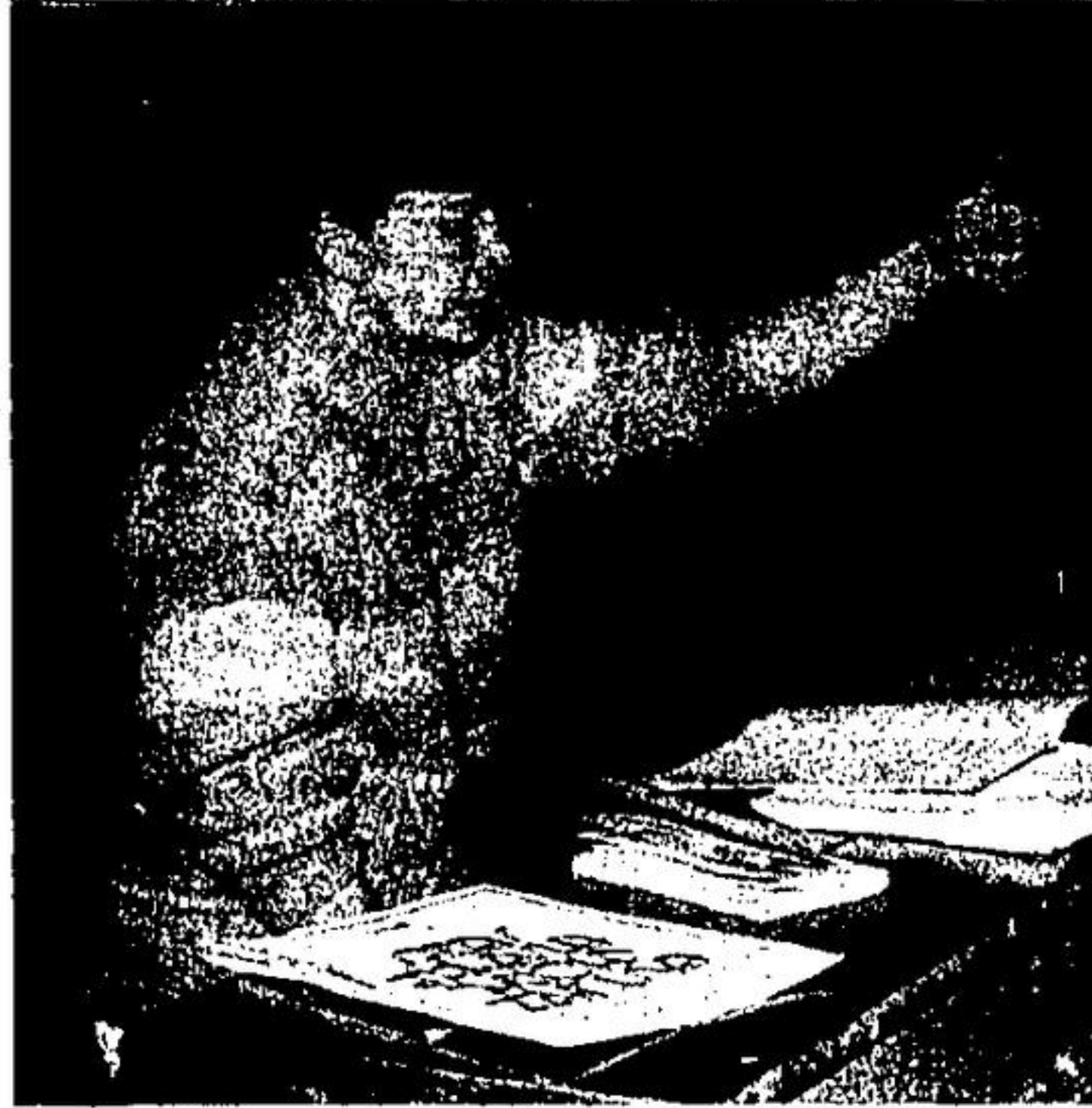
Parting gifts to the separate school trustees were a gavel and a table center piece made by students of Oakville's General Wolfe High School. The center piece is a mailbox made of brass.

\$16,800 loan

The seniors will be going to St. Andrews United Church again this year. Their entertainment will begin with a sing-a-long to the music of the church's organist on piano. The Georgetown Girls' Pipe Band is scheduled to play.

Tea, coffee and snacks will also be served, and door prizes will be awarded. Local merchants have shown their generosity by donating door prizes, Mr. Gregory said.

Santa Claus will be visiting the different buses during the evening, giving out candy canes and laughs, Mr. Gregory said.

The evening will probably be over between 10:30 and 11 p.m.

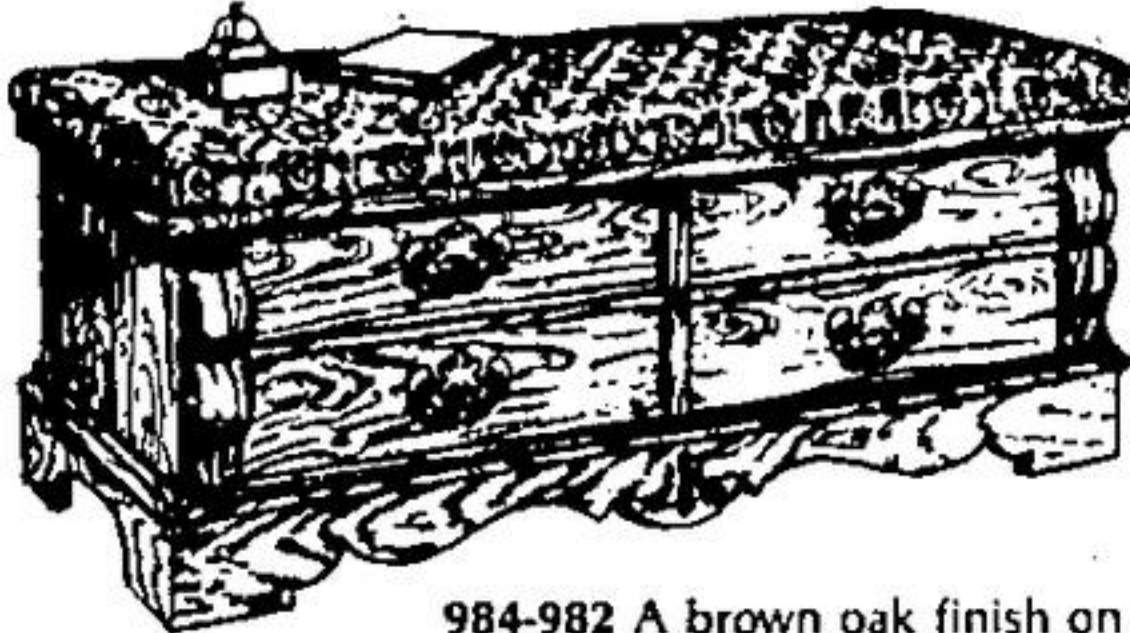

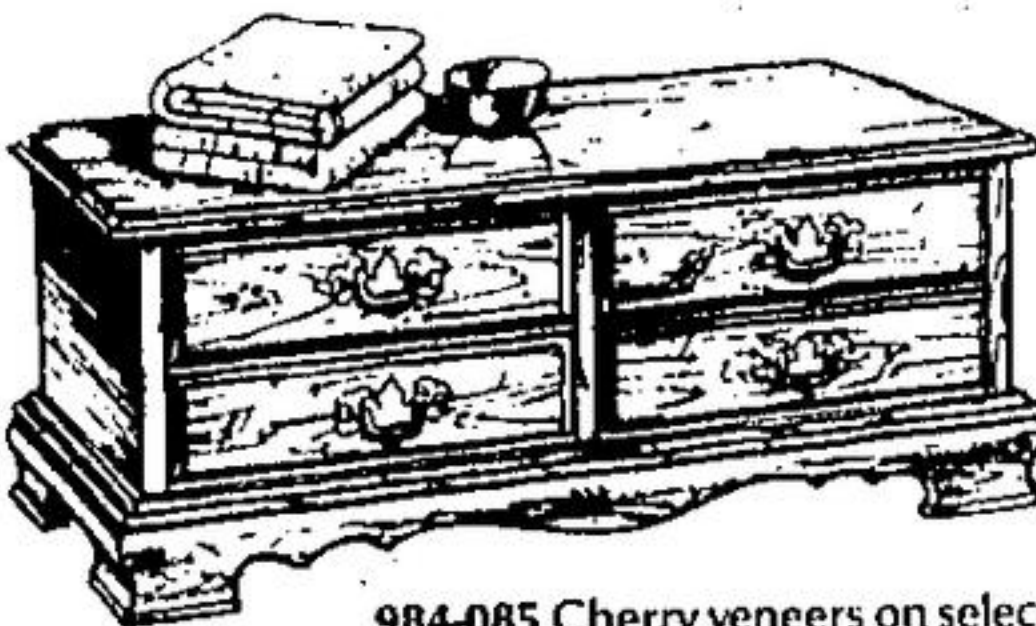
