Gemini Board decides against changes

Herald Sports Editor The Georgetown Pontlac-Finick Gemini Board of Directors has given its Hockey Operations personnel a vote of confidence, putting to rest rumors wholescale changes in the department would be taking place.

The unanimous motion to resist making changes came Wednesday at the Board's first annual midseason review meeting. After a discussion and an opportunity for Board members to vent their concerns, all 15 directors present voted in favor of the Hockey Operations people maintaining their jobs for the

Russiani victim of bad rumors

For some time now the stories revolving around the Georgetown Pontiac-Buick Gemini off the ice have been infinitely more interesting than those of the club's fortunes on the ice. The rumor mill had been working overtime, particularly on the status of team assistant general manager Jules Russiani. A number of anonymous Gemini executive members made It clear they wanted Russlani fired, saying the former Gemini coach had too much input with the players and head coach Gary Hudson. Further it was being said former Georgetown Chrysler Raider Dave Tataryn had been offered Russiani's position, something that has been labelled

untrue by Tataryn.

But all the rumors were put to rest Wednesday when the Gemini Board of Directors voted in favor of retaining all its Hockey Operations personnel. Interestingly enough, with all the supposed unrest concerning Russiani, little was publicly mentioned against him at Wednesday's meeting when the opportunity presented itself. Gemini president Dave Kentner was the only one to officially voice an o inlon, saying at first he had reservations about hiring Russiani because Russiani symbolized "The Old Gemini". However Kentner also said around the league and Ontario Hockey Association Russiani's contacts are unsurpassed. Kentner added it's the club's Intention to strengthen itself in terms of Ontario Hockey League contacts, and that's where obtaining someone like Dave Tataryn would come into play, and be rhought in to assist Russiani.

People quickly forget Russiani had resigned last year after Georgetown was eliminated from the league playoffs by Oakville Blades. They forget it was the new Gemini team that approached Russiani about joining the franchise as the assistant general manager.

Russiani's job description is such that he's in charge of recruiting. That means going out and getting hockey players, the best hockey players available. Looking at this year's team it's easy to see Russiani has done that. Here's a list of what Russiani has brought to the Gemini.

-signed Wally Petrie in summer from Acton Sabres. With Acton last year Petrie was named the Mid-Ontario Junior "C" league's MVP and won the Central league's top rookle award two years ago with Vaughan Raiders,

-brought both Joe Washkurak Guelph Platers played a big role in Georgetown getting Washkurak's

-secured the future of the club by signing youngsters like Tom Purcell, Glen Haigh, Warren Hart, Jim McCabe, All are eligible to don the Gemini uniform for the next three years, thus giving the

Georgetown team a solid base. Much of the criticism levelled at Russiani was that he had too much power on the hockey club, In fact, never was a deal made or anything finalized without first consulting with team general manager Bob Hooper. Hooper makes it clear that if he doesn't agree with a move, the move won't be made. Many felt because Hooper wasn't being heard from that Russlani was running the show. In fact, Hooper sald his way of running things is to first listen, think it over, make a deci-

sion and stick by it. Russiani has done his job, and done it well. He has made sure the Gemint hockey team has talent this year and has also seen to it that the team has a sound base for the future. He was hired as a

recruiter and has done so. Many have pointed the accusing finger at Russiani because they felt he was to blame for the team being in sixth place or for personal reasons. The thing is Russiani isn't to blame if the team on the ice doesn't perform to expectations.

remainder of the season.

Rumors of changes began circulating early in the season when the Gemini lost five games in which they had sizeable leads in the final period. When that happened people began voicing their disenchantment towards rookle Gemini coach Gary Hudson. The situation got to the point where before the season was a quarter the way through Hudson began publically wondering when he was going to be fired, a situation that never came to pass.

Shortly after the rumors about Hudson's status diminished, stories began to surface of some Gemini executive members' unhappiness with assistant general manager Jules Russiani. The stories consisted of people feeling Russlani was actually running the hockey club, partly because Russiani was being quoted in the local newspapers and that team general manager Bob Hooper was keeping a low profile. But in actuality Hooper said he was in control as Russiani never made a move without first consulting with his general manager.

Adding fuel to the fire in recent weeks was the Gemini meeting with former Georgetown Chrysler Raiders goalie Dave Tataryn. Shortly after the meeting took place (which was supposed to be a confidential one) further rumors began surfacing that Tataryn would join the Gemini, and the team was going to get rid of Russiani as a result. That scenario was supposed to be enacted at last week's meeting.

When contacted Thursday Tataryn, who was at Wednesday's meeting, said he did meet with Gemini sponsor Barry Whitworth and team president Dave Kentner. However, he added the Gemini didn't offer him anything concrete. The Gemini executive members presented situations and asked

Tataryn for advice, which Tataryn said, was up to the Gemini if they us-

ed or not. "My dealing with Georgetown was having conversations between two friends about different situations and offering my advice," Tataryn said. "The Gemini haven't approached me about joining. They've asked me if I would consider it, but they didn't make me an offer.

"I feel like an innocent bystander. I go into Georgetown, talk to Bear (Barry Whitworth) about hockey and business opportunities and people begin asking what I'm doing here (in Georgetown). People must be feeling threatened. People only feel threatened when they're not secure in their job. Do you think Bob Clarke (Philadelphia Flyers GM) and Mike Keenan (Flyers' coach) are threatened because Scotty Bowman (former Buffalo Sabres coach-GM) got fired? Do you think Gerry McNamara is threatened because Scotty Bowman has been fired? If people go out, do their job and believe in the product they've got nothing to worry about," Tataryn added.

As to whether or not Tataryn will join the hockey club this season, the former Cambridge Hornet doesn't think so. Tataryn believes a Junior B hockey franchise should forgo paying its players, rather trying to establish itself as a professional organization strong in having its players acquire athletic scholarships. After having hockey pay for his degree, it's possible the former Gemini could return to the community and work here and be a constant reminder to younger hockey players as to what the organization can achieve for them If the players work hard.

"I look at organizations like Henry Carr (Metro league), Stratford (Mid-western Ontario league) and Bramalea (Metro league)," Tataryn said. "Those teams follow that guideline and are consistently suc-

cessful." Despite Tataryn's comments concerning his not joining the Gemini, team president Kentner made It clear Wednesday he'd like Tataryn to join. In fact Kentner said Hooper will meet with Tataryn soon, but didn't say what would be discussed. Kentner also added bringing in Tataryn wouldn't necessarily mean someone in the organization isn't doing his job, but that when better per-sonnel are available you must go

after them. "If Dave Tataryn wants to jump in and be at this table I want Dave Tataryn here," Kentner said. "Dave has great hockey contacts. If Scotty Bowman approached us tomorrow and said he wanted to be Vice President of Hockey Operations Jack Handy (current Gemini VP of Hockey Operations) bad better start shaking. You've got to go for the

As for Russiani, the former Gemini coach said Wednesday's vote wasn't a vote of confidence in

"It isn't a vote of confidence. There's been too much said and done. I'm just sick and tired of it," he said.

Hooper had harsh words for those people who were criticizing his coach and assistant general manager. As far as the Gemini GM was concerned, Hudson and Russiani were doing fine and didn't need to be looking over their shoulder the result of the rumors when something

"My biggest concern is we have a whole lot of people doing the criticizing and they hardly come to the arena to watch a game. If they do, they don't watch the whole game. My guys have had enough of this.

Gemini lose out on getting Anthony

Milton Merchants' loss won't turn out to be Georgetown Pontiac-Buick

Gemini's gain. Early last week Georgetown was in the running to obtain the services of forward Rod Anthony. However, those feelings of optimism were dashed Thursday when the former Blade signed with Burlington Cougars.

Anthony was sent to Milton two weeks ago by Oakville Blades to complete a deal the two clubs had arranged late last year. Last season Milton (then called Steamers) sent Tim Pollen and Bob Anthony to Oakville and the Blades' sending of Anthony to Milton completed the

However, soon after Anthony became Milton property he made it clear he didn't want to play for the Merchants. When Merchants' general manager Vern Gooding asked Anthony where he'd like to go, Anthony said his first choice was Burlington but that he'd also come to Georgetown if sent here.

By coincidence Gemini assistant general manager Jules Russiani was present when Anthony made the statement at the Central league allstar contest played in Barrie a couple of weeks back. A deal between

Anthony was in Burlington's lineup Friday night when the Cougars lost 5-4 to Georgetown. He had a goal and an assist.

Acquiring Anthony would have been a big plus for the Gemini. To date Georgetown has been able to remain amongst the league leaders in goals given up (tied for third with 108) but have had trouble putting the puck in the net (seventh with 88). The last two years Anthony has finished second in the Central league scoring race.

Russiani was disappointed the Anthony deal couldn't be worked out. He said bolstering Georgetown's goal production is important, and acquiring a goal-scorer remains a high priority. The Gemini are in good shape should a goal-scorer become available. The team still has three import cards left.

"Our stats to goals-for aren't the greatest," he said. "We need more scoring punch, Any time you can go after a goal-scorer like that (in Anthony) you've got to go for it. Rod said he's played against Georgetown in the past and has always respected Georgetown. Besides that he's a good kid."


league play she added. "You really do forget about the calibre of play and how good some teams can be," Andrews sald, "When you get away from playing "A" teams you are quick to forget
