Shoppers spending for Christmas '86

Acton's Olde Hide House expects this year's sales to be the best of the six years they have been open. Each year is getting better, said Steve Dawkins, the store's general manager.

Sales at the Hide House are up 30 per cent from what they were at this time last year, Mr. Dawkins said. During the week many Hide House customers are from north Halton, and on weekends the store is seeing customers from all over, he said.

Most of Georgetown's Radio Shack customers either work or live in the area. "Sales are definitely up. There seems to be a lot of money around," said Radio Shack manager Dan Morenez.

Since the Christmas shopping began at Radio Shack, about mid-November, sales are up by about 25 per cent, Mr. Morenez said. "In our store, computer sales are sky-rocketing. That's why sales are up." Sales have been "fairly strong" so

far at Acton's Canadian Tire, said Eric Sellers, the owner. A steady supply of goods is going to help Canadian Tire beat sales of last year when some shortages were a pro-

"We're selling a lot of everything. We have an endless supply," Mr. Selters said. VCRs, stereo systems, cassette players are all popular items this year at Canadian Tire. As every year, toys and decorations are also popular, but the store is not selfing as many computers, Mr. Sellers

Sales have been so good at the Cachet gift shop in Georgetown, owner Barbara Cooke is keeping the store open until 9 p.m. every Friday until Christmas. Usually the store makes 50 to 60 daily sales. Lately the average has been 144 sales per day,

she said. The traffic has been heavy for another Main Street store, but people aren't buying yet. North Halton Sports is getting many inquiries from interested customers. It won't be until just before Christmas that sales take off, said Doug Anderson,

"I'm very busy. People are put-ting things on lay-away." Mr. Anderson said. He won't know how good Christmas sales are until just before Christmas.

Mr. Anderson has the same amount of stock in as last year and he expects to sell more of it this year. Mr. Anderson also expects to see most people pay with credit cards, "especially on the higher priced items."

The song of success is not being sung by all Halton Hills businesses. Elly Snels' Doll Emporium in Acton is experiencing a decrease in business. The store specializes in fancy dolls.

People are coming into her store, but they aren't spending their money, Ms. Snels said. Her porcelain dolls have rare and expensive qualities which many people don't understand, she said. The glass eyes alone cost between \$30 and \$40. They are imported from Europe where only a handful of graftsmen make them, she said. Ms. snets is hoping sales will improve before Christmas.
