MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT

1986 been quite busy for Gemini Board

New Year's is a traditional time to look back and assess the past year and make plans for the new one. 1986 sure has been a fast paced, action packed year for the Gemini. Here are but a few highlights:

APRIL-This brought elections and an elected Board of Directors of 30 people - pretty heady stuff. It took the rest of the month to decide on who would handle what directorate. We also started to develop our method of decision making - the person responsible makes a recommen-

dation to the Board of Directors - all Directors may question, state a point of view or recommend a change before we all vote upon the matter.

MAY-Our Board of Directors introduced Georgetown Pontiac-Buick as the major corporate sponsor, developed a responsible insurance package for club operations, approved the appointment of Bob Hooper as general manager and introduced Jules Russlani as his assistant general manager. The Board also

set our 1986-87 ticket prices, approved the plan of action and budget for our Gold tournament, introduced an "open concept" of our club and invited the media to attend any or all Board meetings, purchased a one-write bookkeeping system, approved a policy opposed to team suspensions and supported Streetsville Derbies with their concern, approved sponsorship of a Georgetown Minor Hockey Association team (the rep Junies).

JUNE-The Board of Directors ap-

proved Gary Hudson as the team's head coach and introduced Chris Milne as the assistant coach. The Board approved a team blazer and a team logo was solidified. A committee was set up under Barry Whitworth to investigate a scholarship program and we contacted our local MPP Don Knight to express our concern over the Government's proposal to redirect lottery funds.

JULY-The Board of Directors approved our 1986-87 playoff ticket prices, approved Pizza Hut as our "Back of the Ticket" sponsor, sold the majority of our sweaters sponsorship under Roy Donahue, introduced a 1986-87 Proposed Budget, initiated an affiliation with the Town of Halton Hills Parks and Recreation Department. During this time many Board members resigned to accept appointments inside our Hockey Operations. Others resigned due to personal reasons.

AUGUST-The Board of Directors approved our pre-season ticket sales and reserved seatings program, approved our Gold tournament sponsors (Georgetown Independent, and Home Hardware), our 1986-87 Pre-season and Regular schedule of hosting games, negotiated a settlement of an outstanding debt to mutual satisfaction, approved a promotional agreement with North Halton Sports, Delrex Smoke Shop and Pizza Hut, approved a Captain's plaque to record our captain and team success each year, held a very successful golf tournament thanks to Karen Harrison and her committee, approved Gerry Osborne as the Vice-President responsible for the Booster Club, approved our first annual Get Acquainted reception for September 24, 1986, approved May 9, 1987 as our Year End Banquet date and May 20, 1987 as the date of our annual meeting and elections.

SEPTEMBER-The Board of Directors adopted the Zellers \$5,000 "Puck Shoot", approved the Gemini Gems promotion with the Georgetown Herald, our program project exceeded \$20,000 in sales, Keith Bennett and his committee conducted a promotional booth at the annual Georgetown Fall Fair, approved our team manual under Keith Bennett's chairmanship, ap-

OCTOBER-The Board of Directors accelerated the "shakedown" process of consolidating the Board of Directors - dropping those who chose not to be involved. The team began the regular schedule and began the process of getting to know who is who and who the coach is and what he wants. The Booster Club-Souvenir Booth-Box office and team operation had a lot of ups and downs along with a lot of rumors.

NOVEMBER-The Program is complete, except for the Playoff pages. Further shaking down of the entire operation as people come and go to form the little teams which will in turn run our organization. We began the preparation for our December "Mid Season Review" of all phases of the hockey team and club operations. Team play began to settle down as we caught up to the rest of the league teams as far as game skills and timing are concerned. A lot of hard work to do to get the ball on a roll.

DECEMBER-The Board of Directors conducted our first mid-season review and amended the budget to reflect the projected incomes. The Board passed a motion of confidence in Hockey Operations, approved a projected increase in front gate revenue and approved an increase in Booster Club revenues. The Souvenir Booth operation is right on target. Still making improvements to be made and some lessons have been learned. We had a very enjoyable Christmas party hosted by the Booster Club. Thanks go to Gerry Osborne and Mae Barnes. The team itself engaged in a respectable unbeaten streak in league play. Darryl Sly and his Senior "A" (intermediate "A", now) Collingwood Shipbuilders came in for the annual Pricebeaters Night and sure taught us a lesson on Dec. 27. Hopefully our players will be able to

apply that lesson come playoff time.

For 1987 one always looks to the New Year to give us a chance to correctly do all the day to day projects which we somehow managed to screw up. In this light I'd like to offer my personal hopes for 1987:

- That our club continue to play 600 hockey (at home?) and finish in fourth spot in the regular standings.
- Than Handy, Hooper, Hudson and Russlani fill the last four cards with goal-scoring and a "Big Defenceman" who can skate and handle the puck (familiar wish).
- That we finish the 1987 playoffs as winners so the 23 young people who played for us will be both glad and proud to be a Gemini.
- I look for a Board of Directors which will be filled out to 30 again with people committed to working to building a first class hockey club.
- I look forward to a more open, public executive with people freely coming to express ideas or concerns.
- I look forward to a full arena during playoffs.
- I look forward to a balanced budget and a better cash flow in 1987.
- I look forward to the first recipient of a scholarship for playing Junior "B" hockey with the Gemini.
- I look forward to a revised and consolidated constitution.
- I look forward to our election so a confirmed Gemini executive can build on the successes and failures of this year to bring a championship to the Gemini in 1987-88.
