# Artists still teach variety of crafts

The Credit Valley Artisans, despite being homeless with the closure of Cedarvale Park Cottage, are still luring noted artisans to teach arts and crafts courses to the public. The following are January and February workshops, with more to come in March and April.

**Marquetry with Ross Colter**  
Back due to popular demand for a second showing now at the Georgetown Cultural Centre, Ross Colter has worked in the art of marquetry for twenty years. The ancient technique involves making pictures and designs using various species of wood veneers. Mr. Colter's students will learn to cut the woods into particular shapes and then fit them together in a picture in much the same way as a jigsaw puzzle. The course will be held on Thursday evenings, January 29 to March 5. Beginner Weaving with Joanna Dobbin

The current revival in heritage preservation and interest in fine, handcrafted goods has stimulated hobbyists like Joanna Dobbin to turn professional. A member of an artisan's collective, "The Painted Web", Ms. Dobbin's handwoven garments, rugs, coverlets and table linens are sold at craft fairs and galleries throughout southern Ontario.
