Fire calls up...but damage . down in '86

Although fire calls were up in December, the damage due to fires was down over December 1985.

The Halton Hills Fire Department report shows there were 35 calls for service in December, with damages of \$18,510.

No firefighters or members of the public were injured or died because of fire in December.

How did 1986 compare with 1985? According to the report, there were 407 calls for service in 1986 compared with 398 in 1985. Not much dif-

ference there. In terms of damage due to fire. there was \$552,374 in damages in 1986 compared with \$753,734 in 1985. That's a significant difference.

Both years, there were no deaths either to the public or to firefighters because of fire. That's something to be proud of.

However, more firefighters were injured in 1986 than in the previous year. In 1986, 15 firefighters were hurt on the job compared to nine in 1985. Four members of the public were injured in 1986 compared to six

Library wants a 'growth' budget

Herald Staff To increase the inadequate size of the Halton Hills Public Libraries' collection, the library board will be asking town council for a 23 per cent

increase in the library budget. That decision was made at their Jan. 7 board meeting. An additional \$92,000 is needed each of the next three years to bring the collection closer to provincial standards, said

Betsy Cornwell, chief Ilbrarian. If the library receives \$92,000 each of the next three years, the collection will have the average size collection of the last quarter of Ontario libraries in the Halton Hills size range. For a size range between

Fewer homes built in '86

There was nearly half a million dollars less in building projects for new homes in 1986 than in 1985. A building department report for

December, released Monday night, shows building activity in the residential, commercial and industrial sectors for Halton Hills. According to the report, \$9,014,575 in new homes went up in 1986 compared with \$9,450,941 in 1985 and

December 1986 saw a lot more activity in new homes, \$1,598,000 worth, than in previous Decembers. In the commercial category. building was down slightly in 1986. There was \$2,006,300 in new commercial buildings compared to \$3,762,450 in 1985 and \$1,139,800 in

\$4,472,010 in 1984 - this, although

In the industrial category, 1986 shows there was only a half million dollars worth of new industry building compared to \$4.1 million in 1985 and \$1.9 million in 1984. This is mostly due to the lack of industrial land in town. With the acdeptance of the Georgetown Secondary Plans by the Ministry of Municipal Affairs, there will be 400 new acres for in30,000 to 50,000 people, Halton Hills has the smallest collection in the

province, Mrs. Cornwell said. The total amount the library will be asking town council for is about \$800,000. Without the request for \$92,000 the rise in the town's contribution to the library would be 7 per cent, Mrs. Cornwell said. Last year the library received \$657,000 from the town.

Books, records, tapes and compact discs are examples of items in the Halton Hills libraries' collection. Currently, the average number of items in that collection is one item per person less than the provincial average of towns in the same size

The provincial average for towns 30,000 to 50,000 is 2.69 items per person, Mrs. Cornwell said. About \$700,000 would be needed to bring the collection up to the provincial average, she said.



The Library Board will also be asking for the equivalent of another staff person for 1987. During the Jan. 7 board meeting the plan to request \$24,000 for extra staff was reduced to \$15,000. Improving the collection was identified as the priority. It is better to have the Ferrari (the collection) before hiring the driver (the staff) for the Ferrari, said Jay

Jackson, a Library Board member. For Ontario libraries in the same size range as Halton Hills, the equivalent of 28 full-time staff is average, Mrs. Cornwell said. Halton Hills has the equivalent of slightly less than 23 staff members.

The number of people using the library is related to the size of the population and the size of the collection, Mrs. Cornwell said. Over the last few years there has been little change in either, she said.

Compared to other departments supported by local taxes the Acton and Georgetown libraries have done well at budget time, members of the Library Board said at the meeting.

The town budget has been keeping up with inflation, not the needs of the library. In the 12 years Mrs. Cornwell has been chief librarian, the

budget has never concentrated on growth, she said. The library board would like to change that this year.

The need for an access for the handicapped at Acton's library was discussed Jan. 7. The board stressed the need for a study on the access to be completed soon, so that it might

The total expenditures for the

library in 1987 are estimated to be \$929,955. The board would like to see about \$811,000 of that come from the town. The rest will come from the library. In addition to revenue gained from fines, photocoples and other local

sources, the library will receive \$86,000 from the provincial government, Mrs. Cornwell said. That grant is a per household grant. By the end of February, when the

library board's requests go before
