

## Police beat

### Industrial mishap

The arm of a 23-year-old man became badly mangled in a conveyor belt Sunday morning while he was trying to clean it.

Michael Cor of Alberta is in serious condition at Toronto General Hospital. He was transferred there from Milton District Hospital.

Halton Regional Police said Mr. Cor was attempting to clean the conveyor belt when his right arm became caught in it. The belt pulled him into the machinery at the Dufferin Quarries in Acton. The accident took place at 9:15 a.m.

### Erratic driving

Erratic driving alerted police to a drunk driver Sunday at 1 a.m. at Guelph Street and Winston Churchill Boulevard. The driver turned out to be a 17-year-old. He's to appear in Milton provincial court March 26 on impaired driving charges.

### Hash possession

A 19-year-old Georgetown man has been charged with possession of hashish. Charges were laid by Halton Regional Police Jan. 12 at 9 p.m. The fellow was picked up at the Gordon Alcott Arena. He's to appear in Milton provincial court Feb. 16.

### Twice burned

It's bad enough having your car broken into once, but twice in the same week?

An unlucky Prince Anne Drive resident had a box of stereo cassette tapes stolen from his unlocked vehicle overnight Jan. 13.

Worth \$300, the cassettes were found a short distance away from the car, scattered on the ground, Halton Regional Police said.

The next night, the same car was broken into, except this time, thieves had to force the door open as the owner had locked up. This time, a Pioneer stereo amplifier worth \$114 was taken. Police are investigating.

### Break and enter

A 20-year-old Georgetown man was arrested by Halton Regional Police this week and charged with break and enter and theft. The man had a bail hearing Friday. Most of the property, which included jewellery and a camera, has been recovered, police said.

The same man was charged Thursday afternoon with possession of LSD and marijuana. He was arrested on River Drive.

### Window smashed

The rear side window of a car was smashed in Jan. 10 and \$400 worth of radio equipment and two speakers were stolen from it. The car was parked on Georgetown's Cherry Street.

### Barking alarm

A barking dog alerted a Victoria Street, Georgetown man to the fact something was wrong, Friday at 5:15 a.m. The man went out to check and found four wheel discs had been removed from his 1984 Ford pickup. They're worth \$500.

### Minor injuries

A 52-year-old Georgetown man suffered minimal injuries Sunday night when he lost control of his car on Winston Churchill Boulevard at Sideroad 5.

Headed north, the driver said he was blinded by the headlights of a car coming from the opposite direction, lost sight of the road, and went into the ditch. His 1977 Ford was stopped by a concrete culvert at a private drive.

There was \$3,500 damage to the Ford, and another \$1,000 damage to an underground Bell Canada cable box that was destroyed. The man was charged with dangerous driving and had his licence suspended for 12 hours.

### Drug charges

Possession of marijuana charges were laid against a 17-year-old from Georgetown shortly after midnight Jan. 13. Halton Regional Police arrested the youthful offender at 62 Park Ave., and also charged him with possession of a prohibited weapon, a spring knife to be exact. He's to appear in Milton provincial court March 2.

## Talk on apartheid

Jan. 26 at 7:30 p.m. the most Reverend E.W. (Ted) Scott, immediate past Primate of the Anglican Church of Canada, will be in Georgetown to give a talk on Apartheid at St. George's Anglican Church (60 Guelph St.).

Archbishop Scott is most recently known for his participation in "The Commonwealth Group - South Africa" (also known as The Committee of Eminent Persons) which visited South Africa in 1986. This group was working to find means to persuade the government of South Africa to abandon its policy of Apartheid. The group was disbanded when there appeared little hope of success.

Archbishop Scott was Moderator of the World Council of Churches (WCC) from 1975 to 1981. An impor-

tant aspect of the WCC was its "Program to Combat Racism".

Archbishop Scott is currently President of the Canadian Council of Churches. Just last June, the 67-year-old Archbishop resigned his fifteen-year Primacy of the Anglican Church of Canada at the Church's General Synod in Winnipeg.

Archbishop Scott says that one of his special concerns is "the whole question of how, in reality, you can give expression to love and concern for people in a society where relationships are immensely structured and complex. The whole outreach of the Church into our social structure is very important. The Church and State should not have separate concerns and the Church should be encouraging greater social responsibility to all corporate bodies as well as of individuals."

## Block Parents unite forces

Block Parents of Acton and Georgetown want to amalgamate their two groups into one.

A general meeting has been scheduled for Jan. 27 to formalize their intentions and create Block Parents of Halton Hills.

Although originally formed to help prevent child molestings and abductions, the Block Parent Program has grown and expanded since its inception in London, Ontario in 1983.

The largest age group using Block Parents proved to be 5-13 year-olds. Incidents of bullying were the biggest single type of incidents reported, followed by bicycle accidents.

## Region spends \$15,000 more for Acton water well plan

Another \$15,000 is going to be spent on the Prospect Park well project by Halton Region.

This time, the money is going for a preliminary design of the proposed well next to Fairy Lake.

Halton's Public Works Director John Moore says, however, the project has been scaled down. Instead of drawing one million gallons of water daily from the Prospect Park well, the new strategy is to draw half that amount.

This decision to scale down the amount of water to be drawn came after discussions with the Ministry of the Environment and the Credit Valley Conservation Authority. Mr. Moore says in a report to Regional Councilors.

The firm of R.V. Anderson Associates Limited is being recommended to prepare the preliminary design and to review the technology they came up with in a 1983 report on the well. Their previous engineering and negotiations on Halton behalf with the Ministry are part of the reason Mr. Moore is recommending them for this project.

"Are we just forcing ahead as if we do have permission, so when the time comes we'll be prepared?"

Const. Rick Bonnette asked last week in planning and public works committee.

The Region still hasn't Ministry authority to use Prospect Park well. Mr. Moore said it's because there hasn't been a Ministry okay yet that "a relatively small amount of money" is being spent on the preliminary design. It still runs the risk of being turned down.

He noted Acton needs the water from Prospect Park well in order to supply the water needs of a 10,000 population. The community currently has a population of 7,000 and businesses, and politicians want it to grow to 10,000.

The Region will monitor the aquifer underground near the well (drains from) and Black Creek when the well is put into operation and after it is in operation. This monitoring will determine the effect both on Fairy Lake and the Black Creek basin of withdrawing water from Prospect Park well.

Prospect Park well isn't a new idea. Back in 1972, the well was put into operation but there were water quality problems, which Anderson Associates was hired to look at.

The public works director recommends the well be reactivated to draw half a million gallons daily and

preliminary approval from the Ministry be obtained to construct it.
