# Kemp and Orser compete

Georgetown figure skater Darren Kemp found skating behind Conadian champion Brian Orser this past week the toughest skate of his life.

Kemp was competing with Orser as a Senior in the Eastern Canadian Divisional championships in Barrie Jan. 14 to 18. After placing fourth in the Figures and fifth in the Short Program, Kemp dropped to seventh overall after the Long Program.

"I'm a rookle in the Senior category where guys have been skating for four or five years. I did the best I could do in the toughest division in Canada," Kemp said. The top four or five skaters in the Eastern Canadian Division will probably place in the top six in Canada,

Kemp had to skate behind Brian Orser, seven time Canadian cham-

pion, who is ranked second in the world, in his short program. "I skated clean (no mistakes)," Kemp said. It was a satisfying performance.

Of his overall performance at the competition Kemp said he learned a lot. The next year will be spent preparing for the same competition which is a step toward the Canadian champlonships. He didn't qualify this year for the national contest with his seventh place. Only the top four skaters quality.

Competition was particularly tough this year, because so many older and experienced skaters are staying in competition in hopes of making the Olympic team next year, Kemp said. Kemp's goal is to make the 1992 Olympic team. He and his coaches will be preparing for that

He trains under Peter and Sonya Dunfield in Gloucester in Otlawa. They are the coaches of the Canadian women's single champion, Liz Manley. When at home he skates out of Oakville under Wally Distelmeyer. When not in Ottawa Kemp works for his father. Mr. Kemp installs floor covering and carpet and has a business in Oakville and Burlington.

He is the son of Owen and Valerie Kemp of 39 Joycelyn Crescent in Georgetown. Mrs. Kemp was not in Barrie the past weekend. "I get too nervous, so I stay home, nervous by the phone," she said. Mr. Kemp goes with Darren to the competitions.

Last year the whole family went to the Canadian championships in North Bay. As a Junior Darren finished second in Canada in 1986.

## Andrew, Jennifer Hoddinott reach new skating plateaus

In the history of the Georgetown Figure Skating Club less than ten skaters have received the Canadian Figure Skating Association's Gold Medal, Mrs. Hoddinott said. Jennifer is coached by Nancy Dowding. As a member of the Georgetown club Jennifer will be skating in their Carnival April 5. This year the carnival is called Back to the Future.

She also has an interest in acting and hopes to one day be part of an ice show. For the past two summers Jennier has skated at the Stamford Skating School in Niagara Falls under the direction of Wally Distelmeyer and American dance coach John Haley. She attends St. Mildred's, a private school in Oakville.
