Grossman re-arranges his visit

A tanned Larry Grossman, Ontario's Leader of the Opposition, said his visit to Halton Hills wasn't a pre-election pitch, Wednesday afternoon.

"We're not really here on a sales mission. We'll wait for another time for a sales mission for our party," Mr. Grossman said, addressing a group of about 40 farmers at the Acton Legion.

He said his visit was to try and establish healthy dialogue, now that it was a quiet time.

"I'll be back here another time obviously, to allow me to run the province as premier and Ross Stevenson (agriculture critic) as Minister of Agriculture," Mr. Grossman said.

There was uncertainty whether the provincial leader of the Progressive Conservatives would show up, after morning plans to visit Georgetown's Mold Master then lunch with local politicians at Milton's Bayrischer-Hof Family Restaurant were dropped.

However, Mr. Grossman, Mr. Stevenson, and their small coterie did make it to their afternoon rounds, as per their agenda.

They saw the grain facilities at Frank Anthony's Fifth Line farm, then met with Federation of Agriculture representatives at the Acton Legion.

They did get to Mold Master after all, following the meeting at the Legion.

Reding receives \$1.5 million for new Milton school site

With help from provincial funding, Bishop Reding Secondary Students may have a new school in Milton by September 1988.

An announcement last Friday from Queen's Park indicated \$1.45 million would be given towards the purchase of a new school site for Bishop Reding.

The Roman Catholic school is now using temporary facilities at the old Speyside Public School on Highway 25.

The Halton Roman Catholic Separate School Board has also applied for a \$15 million grant which would be phased in over a number of years with monies going towards a new high school.

A meeting with parents and students was held Wednesday night at Bishop Reding, to inform everyone of the recent developments.

The audience was told that Bishop Reding students will remain at the Speyside site for the 1987-88 school year.

However, by September 1988 phase one of a new building would be completed and ready to accept an

estimated 625 students.

The Board still needs Ministry of Education approval for its plan to build for a September 1988 opening without using relocatable portables, something which was originally discussed.

Currently there are 190 Grade 9 students enrolled at Bishop Reding. Next year, it is estimated 410 students will be attending the school from Grades 9 and 10.

This will mean that 12 more portables will be required in addition to seven already on the Speyside site. Six portables will be joined together and there will be a roof, flooring, a hallway with lockers and more room for a cafeteria. The six-portable unit is called a port-a-pack and can be used elsewhere in Halton Region for other schools, said Principal Art Kelly.

Meanwhile, within the next few weeks an architect will be hired to design the new school, said Chairman of the Board William Hawken.

Legal counsel is presently negotiating for a site in Milton and an announcement is expected in the near future, he said.

Four injured

Three Kitchener people and a man from Milton received a variety of injuries in an accident which began when a driver failed to yield the right-of-way. The Milton driver was northbound on the Ninth Line at about 5:30 p.m. when he stopped at a stop sign before turning onto Sideroad 10. When pulling onto Sideroad 10, the Milton driver collided with westbound traffic, police said.

The Milton driver was taken to Georgetown and District Memorial Hospital with three other victims in the other vehicle. He was treated for major injuries and released Wednesday.

Larry Hurley, 26, of Kitchener was driving the other car and received minor injuries. Delphine Hurley, 22, and also of Lorne Ave. in Kitchener, received major injuries, and Aaron Hurley, 2, received minor injuries. They were treated and released from Georgetown and District Memorial Hospital.
