

## No free trade farming

### says Larry Grossman

Agriculture isn't likely to be a free trade subject, provincial Progressive Conservatives leader Larry Grossman reassured last week. Speaking to area farmers, he said he would be "extremely surprised" if there were any serious free trade discussions on agriculture. "I suspect it's not going to be a starter at the table," Mr. Grossman said. "I don't think there's any agriculture minister in his or her right mind who would support getting rid of the very successful supply management program that has worked here."

The PC leader was responding to concerns of Jeff Nurse, a dairy Mr. Nurse noted the U.S. Dairy programs are short sighted, dont work, and a " complete mess". He wants the current supply management pro-

"I'm not party to the free trade discussions," Mr. Grossman admitted. "But I do know the federal minister is of sound mind and understands the ministry well."

He said taking the supply management program off would be a foolish move, and said it was the heart and soul of the success story in Canada. Provincial agriculture critic Ross Stevenson agreed. "I question any political party, for a great many reasons, dismantling supply management. I think supply management has other threats to it worse than free trade. I think you've got more worries to keep yhou awake at night than that one." Mr. Stevenson concluded.
