Life after hockey? Rinkrat isn't sure

Is there life after hockey? Kenneth Brown thinks so. "Rinkrat" is not sure.

Kenneth Brown's one-act play *Life After Hockey*, at the John Elliott Theatre Tuesday night, is a funny and moving story of a 32-year-old who never grew up.

The play opens with Kenny "Rinkrat" Brown skating around the stage on rollerblades batting a puck into a net. He is surprised to find he has an audience but he immediately invites us to play a game of shinny. We politely refuse and Rinkrat, relaxed and talkative, decides to tell us the story of his life.

Rinkrat describes life on the Prairies in an era he called troubled by the Cuban Missile Crisis and a Conservative Party majority with "The Die" in Ottawa. His passion for hockey began with his brother's leather gloves and his mother's *Chateleine* magazines for shin pads.

Now, in his adult years with a wife, Alma and a daughter, "Little Alma", Rinkrat is still skating the ice, searching for players and trying to recapture a simpler world when there were only two NHL teams that counted - the Leafs and the Canadiens.

Mr. Brown has a good grasp of a modern Canadian consciousness. Rinkrat expresses his disappointment with "perverse American influences" in the All-Canadian game.

When Rinkrat looks to the ceiling to ask "Dear Number 99" for help with his backhand, every Canadian child's reverence for Gretzky shines through.

The climax of the play is Rinkrat's re-enactment of Mike Bossy's winning goal at the Canada Cup in 1981. Rinkrat tells us that Bossy actually look sick and Rinkrat, after Guy Lafleur talked him into going back to hockey, was forced to replace Bossy in the final period of the game.

The puck sailed past the Soviet goaltender and "dropped like a stone into the river of time. Rinkrat's fantasy gets the better of him, though; his reluctance to go home to Alma and little Alma signifies his reluctance to accept his responsibilities, to give up hoping for the NHL once and for all and live a normal life.

In an interview later, Mr. Brown said he enjoyed writing *Life After Hockey*, which first appeared at the Edmonton Fringe Festival in 1985. The current tour includes 47 shows across Canada and will close in Vancouver.

"We've played parts of Eastern Canada where the Diefenbaker joke falls flat," he said.

If you're fond of love stories and can remember the first time you fell for someone, you will enjoy G.I.T.'s production of *Last Real Summer* which opens Feb. 20 for a six night run. If you enjoyed the *Summer of '42* or *My American Cousin*, you'll appreciate a look into yesteryear to see what it was like growing up in a different era.

Seventeen-year-old Lizzie Tingley, played by Chris Farrugan, has fallen in love with her classmate Dougie Cameron, played by Don Macrae. They meet secretly in the Cameron barn regularly and discuss all those things so important to young teenagers.

The action takes place in the summer of 1939 in Western Canada and prepare yourself to shed a tear or two in remembering the trials and tribulations that go along with being Doug and Lizzie's age.

Their relationship is further complicated by the fact that Doug has

decided to join the army. He has a yearning for adventure and doesn't want to fall in his father's footsteps and become a farmer. Lizzie is distraught at his plans and makes a shocking announcement of her own.

Their parents, played by Shirley Scott, David Clifton, Joyce Holland, and Barry Wright, try to talk some sense into their offspring. The youngsters are determined to make their own decisions however and some tense moments are a result. As the drama unfolds, Lizzie's older self (played by Audrey Houston) offers humorous comment on the situation. She interprets Lizzie's feelings and does some adult editorializing at the same time.

If you plan to see *Last Real Summer*, bring your knees with you. It is a play that will make you laugh, make you cry and help you remember what it feels like to be seventeen again.
