Mike Peleschak started teaching at G.D.H.S. in September, 1960. He taught English to 5, 4 and 2 year students in the Arts and Science, Science, Trade and Technology and Business and Commerce courses. He was involved in extra-curricular activities such as drama, spelling bees and first aid at sports events.

It was through the instrumentality of Mr. and Mrs. Lambert that Mr. Peleschak got involved in the Georgetown Little Theatre. He was heavily involved with the St. John's United Church, the inauguration of the Georgetown YM/YWCA and volunteer ambulance brigade.

Mr. Peleschak says, "We were very active in car rallies, driving our Citroen with the Triangle Car Club. We remember fondly our drives in Jack Walker's Mini 'Coope' and the late Len Young's Austin Healey."

The Peleschaks left Georgetown in the summer of 1966. He was the vice principal at Uxbridge Secondary School for five years. Here he got involved with the church, Red Cross and the Recreation Commission (chairman).

In 1971 he assumed the principalship of Anderson C.V.I. in Whitby. He then moved to Dunbarton High School in Pickering in 1978. Dunbarton has the largest Dramatic Arts program in Ontario. Last year (1986) he was seconded to become an education officer in charge of curriculum development with the Durham Board of Education.

The Peleschaks and their three children live in Ajax. Mike is still involved in OSSTF, the Secondary School Principals Association, Ajax Waterfront Needs Committee, World Wildlife Federation, the Hydro-Electric Commission and amateur radio operation.

Mike remembers the many wonderful friends in Georgetown and the OSSTF fellowship. He sends his best wishes on G.D.H.S. Centennial celebrations on July 3, 4 and 5.

Reloading workshop

The ammunition reloading workshop returns for a second year to Cold Creek Conservation Area in Bolton March 21 from 8:30 a.m. to 5 p.m.

The one-day workshop costs \$30 and includes lunch. The workshop covers step-by-step procedures on basic and more advanced techniques of reloading both metallic centre-fire and shell ammunition. Powders and related components will be examined, and participants will have

the opportunity to try their hands at reloading.

Representatives from reloading equipment manufacturers will demonstrate their equipment and have it available for sale.

Vet college birthday

With a flourish of kilts and bagpipes, the Ontario Veterinary College at the University of Guelph will begin celebrating its 125th birthday Feb. 12. The college is the oldest veterinary school in continuous operation in North America.

A special lecture by eminent Scottish scientist Dr. William F.H. Jarrett, whose work pioneered AIDS research, will commemorate the founding of the college and the unique contributions of the veterinary medical profession in the advancement of scientific knowledge and disease control. Dr. Jarrett, of the University of Glasgow Veterinary School, will give a public lecture. "Vaccination

Against Retroviruses: From AIDS to AIDS," in the university's War Memorial Hall at 3 p.m. His work on Feline Acquired Immune Deficiency Syndrome (FAIDS) has been the basis for subsequent research into AIDS.

Tasty Recipes

SCOTCH OAT COOKIES

- 1 cup sifted flour
- 1 tsp. baking powder
- 1/2 tsp. salt
- 1 tsp. sugar
- 2 cups oatmeal (NOT Rolled Oats or Quick Oats)
- 1/2 cup shortening
- 1/2 cup milk

Sift flour, baking powder, salt and sugar together. Add oats and rub in shortening. Add milk gradually; do not have dough too dry. Roll very thin and cut into squares or triangles. Bake in 350° oven for 12 to 15 minutes, or until lightly browned.
Yields 24 cookies.
