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Tasty Recipes

SCOTCH OAT COOKIES

- 1 cup sifted flour 1 isp. baking powder
- 1/2 tsp. salt
- 1 tbsp. sugar 2 cups gatmeal
- (NOT Rolled Oats or Quick Oats) - 1/2 cup shortening

- 1/4 cup milk Sift flour, baking powder, salt and

sugar together. Add oats and rub In shortening. Add milk gradually: do not have dough too dry. Roll very thin and cut into squares or triangles. Bake in 350° oven for 12 to 15 minutes, or until lightly browned.

Yields 24 cookies.

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


