

Impaired

After being stopped for a traffic violation Sunday at 5:50 a.m., a 27-year-old Georgetown man was charged with impaired driving. He was stopped at Mountainview Road and Delrex Boulevard and will appear in court March 23.

Another Georgetown man was found impaired in his parked car on Main Street in Georgetown. He was discovered and charged at 1 a.m. Feb. 15. He will appear in court March 23.

A Rockwood man was charged with impaired driving following an accident Sunday at 2:47 p.m. The man was northbound on the Sixth Line at an unknown speed and was weaving his vehicle from side to side, police said. An Acton man driving southbound on the Sixth Line attempted to avoid the weaving car and collided with it. Both drivers suffered minimal injuries and both cars received \$3,000 damage.

Stalled engine

A stalled engine caused a Georgetown woman to crash into a tree on Mill Pond Road and Stewarttown Road Feb. 8. Jennifer Brabant, 22, of 20 Noble Court in Georgetown, was treated for minor injuries and released from Georgetown and Memorial District Hospital.

The driver was eastbound on Mill Pond Drive at the stated speed of 25 kilometres per hour when her engine stalled and her steering locked, police said. The car slid on the icy road and entered the south ditch where it hit a tree. Damage to the car was estimated at \$8,000.

Fails to yield

A Milton woman was charged with failing to yield the right-of-way after an accident which caused \$5,000 damage to two vehicles. The accident was at Sideroad 15 at Highway 25 Feb. 9 at 11 a.m.

The Milton woman was westbound travelling with a 4-year-old and a 5-year-old on Sideroad 15. She was stopped and reversing into a driveway on Sideroad 15 when a Windsor man eastbound on Sideroad 15 collided with her car, police said. The Windsor man braked and slid sideways on the ice-covered road into the left side of the Milton woman's car.

Tire thief

The tire and rim of a car parked at 318 Guelph St. were stolen last weekend. The rim tire were worth \$230.

A Volkswagen Beetle parked in the Canadian Tire parking lot in Acton received \$600 damage last weekend. The windshield, driver window, inside and outside mirrors were broken and the rear seat was stolen.

Drug charge

Being drunk in a public place led to charges of possession of a narcotic for an Acton man. The 20-year-old man was stopped by police at Park Avenue and Market Street in Acton at 11:50 p.m. Feb. 13. He was discovered with marijuana cigarettes in his possession. The man will appear in court March 9.

Friday was an unfortunate day for an Acton man who lost the tip of his finger in a machine. James Miller, 27, of Acton was working with a notching and end-cutting machine at Building Products of Canada Ltd. on Main Street North in Acton. The tip of his finger was crushed in the machine, police said.

The light fixtures and bulbs at the end of a Danridge Crescent were the target of a vandal with a pellet gun the evening of Feb. 8. Damage to the Georgetown home totalled \$150.

Two thefts

A 14-year-old Acton male was arrested last week for two thefts in Acton. A VCR was taken from a Cobblehill Road home, and \$800 was stolen from a Norman Avenue home Feb. 6. The VCR was recovered. The youth was charged Feb. 13 and will appear in court March 20.

3 long-term town employees honored

Calculating the taxes manually was one of the many jobs Cathy Bouskilla used to do when she started work for the former Township of Esquimaux in October 1959.

Mrs. Bouskilla was one of three longtime employees of the town who were honored Monday night. The others were Ed McGilloway and Frank Morette.

When Cathy started working for the Township of Esquimaux, office staff was the clerk-treasurer, assessor, roads superintendent and herself. The Township offices were in the Stewarttown Community Centre.

It wasn't until 1962 that this staff moved into the existing municipal administration building, and not until the late '60s that another secretary was hired by the Township.

Upon the retirement of Mr. K.C. Lindsay, Cathy was appointed deputy clerk for the Township. Then in 1974, with the formation of Regional government, she became assistant clerk for the Town of Halton Hills.

Mrs. Bouskilla now works as secretary to the town's planning department and Committee of Adjustment. A Glen Williams resident, she attends St. Alban's Anglican Church.

An Acton resident all his life, Ed McGilloway has been a member of the former Acton Fire Department and now the Halton Hills Fire Department for 25 years.

The volunteer firefighter has worked 39 years at the Beardmore Tannery and in May will be celebrating his 35th wedding anniversary.

Wife Dottie and he have four daughters, three sons and 11 grandchildren.

Mr. McGilloway was a member of the Acton Minor and Junior Hockey executives, and of the Acton Figure Skating Club executive.

In 1968, Mr. McGilloway was presented with a long service medal by the Lieutenant Governor at an investiture at the Ontario Fire College.

His son Bill is an active member of the Halton Hills Fire Department; he's a captain.

Frank Morette is the town's general works superintendent. Because of a mix-up over the time of the presentations, Mr. Morette arrived 25 minutes late, and joked over his introduction by the Mayor, "you should have said 'the late,'" he laughed.

Mr. Morette was hired by the Town of Georgetown as one of the Georgetown Works Crew, in September 1960. He worked his way up to public works superintendent in 1963 with the Town of Georgetown then with the Town of Halton Hills in 1974 when Regional government came in.

"He seems to make the job his whole life and devotes a lot of time to the job," the Mayor said.

Proclamation for everyone

Town council had its hands full of proclamations this week.

On the request of the Georgetown chapter of the Kidney Foundation of Canada, March was proclaimed Kidney Month.

The Canadian Physiotherapy Association asked that March 15-21 be called National Physiotherapy Week in Georgetown. Council agreed.

Feb. 20 was declared Kinsmen Day, and Feb. 16-20 Kinsmen Week, in response to a letter from the Kinsmen National President Loyola Sullivan.

As for Feb. 16, it's been proclaimed Heritage Day, and Feb. 18 to 22, Heritage Week. The Ontario Historical Society made this request.

Peel follows GDHS lead

The smoking rules adopted this month at Georgetown District High School have also been adopted for Peel Board of Education schools.

Last week, Peel trustees put a ban on student smoking at all schools and schoolgrounds effective in September. GDHS began its student smoking ban this month.

Peel trustees said teachers won't be banned from smoking at school but will be encouraged to quit. Peel education director John Fraser, a smoker, called for a gradual move toward a smoke-free workplace.

That's the approach GDHS principal Barbara Singleton is taking with her staff. GDHS is the first Halton school to ban student smoking entirely. Teachers are only allowed to smoke in the staff room.

Car on fire

The two-year pilot project is estimated to cost nearly \$49,000, of which Halton would be responsible for \$21,200.

A home sharing co-ordinator would be hired to counsel and match seniors with home sharers.

1987 TAXES - INTERIM BILLING

In accordance with the provisions of The Municipal Act, pursuant to By Law 87.7 adopted by Council on January 12th, 1987, the first two instalments of taxes for 1987 will become due as follows:

ALL WARDS - FIRST INSTALMENT - FEBRUARY 25th, 1987
SECOND INSTALMENT - APRIL 29th, 1987

The above instalments represent an interim billing of 1987 taxes based upon an average of one half of last year's residential mill rates. The final tax bill will be issued about the middle of the year and will also be payable in two instalments, normally the last Wednesday in June and September.

Upon default of payment of the interim tax levy as set out above, a penalty of one and one quarter (1 1/4) percent of the amount in default shall be added on the last day of default and on the first day of each and every calendar month.

Ratepayers who have not received a tax bill should make immediate application at 36 Main Street South, Georgetown, or by telephone (877-5185 or 453-2411)
