Pomeroy lashes out at manager of HRCA

Strong words were uttered against the general manager of the Halton Region Conservation Authority last

Halton's Regional Chairman Peter Pomeroy said "untruthful" and "unfounded" accusations were levied against the Region by Murray Stephen at a public meeting Feb. 10. At the meeting the Walker Wright Young Associates Ltd. study comparing the proposed Milton and Burlington landfill sites was discuss-

Chairman Pomeroy sald Mr. Stephen's comments reflected on the credibility of Regional employees.

When Susan Rogers took over the position of landfill co-ordinator, the whole issue of an environmental assessment was in chaos, Mr. Pomeroy said. He acknowledged relations with other organizations were at a low "to say the least".

"She's worked very diligently over the post year to establish relations and gain their respect," the Regional Chairman said, "The only agency that is causing us trouble is the Halton Region Conservation Authority, or at least the manager of that organization."

He said Mrs. Rogers had some tough agency problems to resolve, problems a lot more serious than those Mr. Stephen raised at the public meeting.

As for Mr. Stephen's accusation that there wasn't any discussion between the Region and the Authority, Mr. Pomeroy said there were meetings April 1, May 2, Nov. 22, 1986, and Jan. 15, 1987. Another is scheduled for March 5. There have also been additional correspondence and telephone conversations not only with Mrs. Rogers but also with the Region's consultants, the chairman

"His presentation was unfounded and untruthful. We need constructive criticism, not some loose cannon rolling around out there," Mr. Pomeroy said.

He said he wanted the Authority to monitor the actions of Mr. Stephen and direct him to co-operate with the Region.


"I was on a Conservation Authority (Credit Valley) for a number of years, and if any member of that staff had continually taken the position Mr. Stephen has taken in this process, he wouldn't be working there," the Regional Chairman said.

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SHORTFALL Road grants from province "disappointing"

There's a shortfall of threequarters of a million dollars in provincial grants to Halton Region for road work.

That was the bad news shared by Halton's public works director Bob Moore last week.

"I'm extremely upset with this funding arrangement with the province for 1987," Mr. Moore said. "I can't express too strongly my disap-pointment in this funding. To say it's disappointing is to be as mild as I can be."

Halton is getting \$2,561,400 for roads construction and maintenance from the province in 1987, significantly less than was an-

ticipated.

Mr. Moore is hoping Halton will get \$69,200 in supplementary funding as it has in the past two years to help its roads program. However, there's no commitment Halton will get this The Region will also be applying

for another \$79,850 in supplementary funds for its 1987 traffic signalization Last year's subsidy program fell short of what Mr. Moore was expec-ting by \$175,000. This year, it's short

by \$720,800. "In preparing the budget for 1967 we anticipated that based upon our road deficiencies relative to other municipalities a 10 per cent increase over last year's allocation could be expected," the public works director

"By leaving this matter at the provincial level, you have a uniform. policy throughout the province.

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
