UW surpasses goal, \$92,000 is raised

One thing the Halton Hills campaign chairman of the United Way learned during the organization's first year is that he picked the right town to live in.

"Halton Hills is a very supportive community," said Campaign Chairman Tom Hewer. The 1986 campaign surpassed the \$87,500 goal. To date \$92,000 is accounted for, and more is expected.

Most United Way organizations in their first year come close to meeting their goal, but do not, Mr. Hewer said. That is what he was told by the provincial United Way Office.

The number of agencies helped by the local United Way totals 17. Because of the promising returns, there will be more money than expected to go around. Any extra money will be spread among the 17 agencies, Mr. Hewer said.

Agencies requesting money will find out how much they get by March 1. The amount they receive is determined by the quality of their service to the community. A board

made up of Halton Hills residents decides on that quality and how much each agency will receive.

If all the requests of the 17 agencies were fulfilled, \$120,000 would have to be collected in this year's campaign, Mr. Hewer does not know how much the campaign will bring in.

A final total won't be determined until December of this year when the last dollar comes in. So many dollars are coming from United Way offices outside Halton Hills. Many people contribute to United Way agencies in cities where they work. That money must be transferred to Halton Hills.

"The first year we realized we wouldn't get the full budget (the \$120,000 requested)," Mr. Hewer said. In the next few weeks the goal for next year's campaign will be set. Mr. Hewer expects that total to be enough to almost cover the requests of agencies. The goal will likely be \$10,000 to \$120,000, he said.

The Halton Hills United Way will be able to give more of the total collected to the agencies next year. In their first year they spent \$27,000 on expenses. Many of these expenses will not be repeated next year. Next year the big expenses will be for salaries and rent.

The United Way rented an office and had one staff person for their first campaign. But they will not have to buy furniture, brochures and other start-up costs next year, Mr. Hewer said.

The Georgetown and Acton Red Cross will receive \$27,000 and \$7,000 respectively this year of the total amount collected by the United Way. This money is guaranteed to them for organizing the residential campaign.

Mr. Hewer, who plans to remain the campaign chairman for the 1987 drive, hopes that arrangement with the Red Cross will continue.

Firm faces OMB hearing

Objections to Dunlop Insurance moving into 500 Guelph Street in Norval have gone the next stage into an Ontario Municipal Board hearing.

Council authorized its staff to ask for a hearing date, Monday night.

Although attempts were made to resolve the concerns of Art Jakobsens and his wife, they were unsuccessful.

The owners of Art's Photographic Centre at 504 Guelph Street say there are already parking problems on Arthur Street and question whether parking spaces on the Dunlop Insurance property will be enough to accommodate customer and employee needs.

The Jakobsens are afraid parking problems on Arthur Street will get even worse. The street gives access to their photography centre and the couple want all parking on Arthur Street banned.

Councillor Gerald Rennie wanted to know what an OMB hearing would cost the town, and if the Jakobsens were to lose would they be paying the town's court costs.

Town administrator-clerk Joe Simon said it costs the town \$125, and said costs could be requested from the plaintiff.

"They normally don't give costs, in my experience," Mr. Simon said. "They are loathe to charge a person who has requested the hearing."

Mayor Russ Miller said it depends on whether the hearing officer thinks the request is frivolous.

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\$1 BILLION SPECIAL CANADIAN GRAINS PROGRAM.

A Helping Hand for Grain Farmers

The Special Canadian Grains Program is assisting farmers with \$1 billion. This initiative, announced by Prime Minister Brian Mulroney, is the largest of its kind ever undertaken by any Canadian government on behalf of farmers.

It is a national program that responds to a national need. It will help offset low grain and oilseed prices resulting from the subsidy war between the European Community and the

United States.

The first \$300 million will be in the hands of grain and oilseed farmers this winter. Another \$700 million will be paid out in the spring.

The details of this historic program are as follows:

1. You will benefit if, in 1986, you grew wheat, barley, oats, rye, mixed grains, corn, soybeans, canola, sunflower seeds for crushing or flax.

Pedigreed seed, high moisture corn, high moisture barley and farm fed grain are also covered.

2. The first cheques are being mailed directly to Western farmers based on Canadian Wheat Board permit book data.

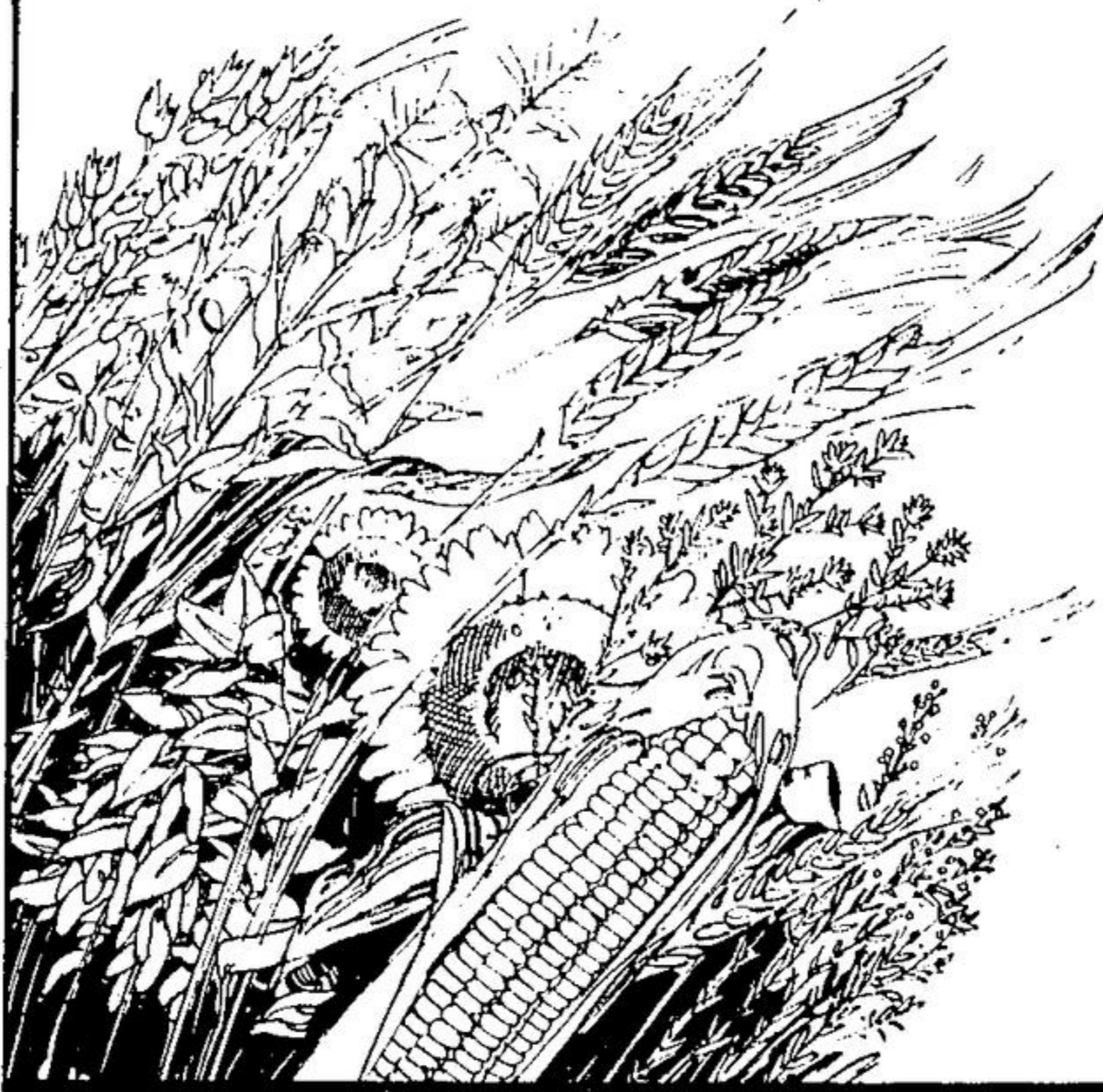
3. If your crops are not included in permit book data, or if you are a qualifying producer who doesn't receive a cheque, you can pick up an application at the following places:

- Offices of Members of Parliament
- Grain elevators
- Grain producer organizations
- Agriculture Canada offices and research stations
- Farm Credit Corporation Offices.
