Hope and opportunity are important words to physically disabled children. Maintaining hope and opportunity to more than 7,000 children in Ontario is what The Easter Seal Society has worked for since its inception in 1922.

Throughout the month of March the Society and its 227 affiliated Easter Seal service clubs will be co-ordinating their 41st annual Easter Seal Campaign. This year the provincial target is \$4 million - the highest goal ever in the Society's history.

"The many needs required by physically disabled children are not immune to rising costs," said Howard Keast, President of The Easter Seal Society.

M.P.P. Report

Enjoying new responsibilities

With the new year underway, I want to bring you up to date on some of the latest items of note.

As I am sure many of you are aware, I am most pleased that the Premier has shown his confidence in me by appointing me Parliamentary Assistant to the Honourable Robert Nixon, Chairman of the Management Board of Cabinet.

I am enjoying my new responsibilities and I will be reporting on related items of interest in future Queen's Park Reports.

I attended the "Future Focus" conference at Geneva Park January

23-25. This session, held near Orillia, provided the Ontario Government with an opportunity to hear from international experts on such topics as how to humanize technology, how to improve our systems of health care and social services and learn more about the significant changes that are directly affecting the way we live today.

"The success of the 1983 Geneva Park Conference in stimulating renewal of thought on current and future issues has led us to organize the "Future Focus" conference," said Government Caucus Chairman Herb Epp. "It is unusual for a government in power to conduct such a conference, but the Premier is most anxious for all of us in government to stretch our thinking above day-to-day concerns from time-to-time."

As part of the Ontario Government's continuing commitment to foster prosperity in Northern Ontario, the Premier announced that the head offices of the Correctional Services Ministry will move to North Bay. Premier Peterson said this move will help create jobs in the North Bay area, and is in keeping with the government's effort to decentralize its operations to northern communities.

Environment Minister Jim Bradley will enhance a Ministry of Agriculture and Food program by \$1 million a year for four years to reduce pollution of rural streams, rivers and lakes from farm animal wastes in designated areas of the province.

This \$4-million grant will enrich the four-year \$22-million Ontario Soil Conservation and Environmental Protection Assistance Program that OMAF has recently improved as OSCEPAP II. The new program is designed to encourage more farmers to build specific structures to help prevent in-stream water pollution.

In making the announcement on behalf of Mr. Bradley, Agriculture and Food Minister Jack Riddell said, "This generous enrichment will increase grant levels and encourage greater participation by farmers to build better manure storage systems and fencing to keep cattle away from streams."

This program is part of the federal-provincial Soil and Water Environmental Enhancement Program (SWEPEP) designed to improve soil and water quality in southwestern Ontario.

VON staff well trained

Although not all VON branches have an Enterostomal Therapy (ET) program, VON Halton Branch does provide this important service to ostomy patients before and after surgery.

An ostomy is a surgical opening created on the abdomen to provide a route for the elimination of body wastes into a removable bag or pouch appliance.

All VON nurses in Halton are trained in counselling, treating, and supporting patients through this traumatic surgical experience.

One VON nurse has had the special JT training. It is this nurse who counsels patients in hospital and at home, and trains the rest of the nursing staff in treating and supporting ostomy patients at home.

SELECT COMMITTEE ON RETAIL STORE HOURS
