Senior finals set to go

The Georgetown Rebels will have to contend with a height disadvantage in this weekend's senior high school basketball championships, but coach Gary Southworth Is going into the sudden death tournament with a feeling of optimism.

Much of Southworth's optimism comes as the result of two good showings his team put in last week, even though they lost a pair of outings.

Tuesday, the Rebels were edged 55-51 by Oakville Trafolgar, and on Thursday they came up on the short end of a 66-60 decision against White

"We lost, but we played really well in both games," Southworth said. "White Oaks is undefeated this year, and in the game with Trafalgar, there was no more than five points difference the whole game."

The Rebels finish in sixth spot in the 10-team conference, with a record of four wins and five losses

Tuesday against White Oaks, Georgetown led 28-26 at the half, and received 19 points from Andrew MacLeod and 10 from John Watts.

The Rebels have five players over 6-ft., which is tall in comparison to many of the other teams. Several of the Rebels' guards are also good jumpers, so Redshaw says they can play an inside game as well, without any problem.

The Rebels' only losses came at the hands of Queen Elizabeth Park, Onkville Trafulgar and Loyola. Aside from the contest with QEP, their losses have been close deci-

If the Rebels finish in fourth place, Redshaw expects they will be back in action again next Wednesday to take on the winner of the fifthagainst-sixth game.

tle to their credit with one game left in their regular schedule. That match was scheduled for Tuesday against Nelson High School of Burl-

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
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Bob Anderson had the lone goal in the game Thursday.
