## Not all support costs

Town grants should be given out only as start-up funds for local groups, argued a town councillor Friday afternoon.

Coun. Joe Hewitt objected to groups still receiving grants from the town after they're established, especially groups such as the Highland Games Association.

"I don't think local taxpayers should be funding outsiders coming and having a good time here. The citizens of this town should not subsidize outsiders at those Games," he said.

The Highland Games Association asked for \$3,500 from the town. Last year they received \$1,976. Councillors at the town's budget committee meeting decided to up it to \$2,055 this year, a four per cent increase.

Couns. Pam Johnston and Lillian Bowman wanted the Games grant deleted in 1987.

"Aren't the Highland Games as important as the Georgetown fall fair?" Coun. Al Cook asked. "They bring a lot of tourists to this town."

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**PIZZA HAMBURGER PIE**

- 1 lb. ground beef
- 1 1/2 tsp. salt
- 1/4 tsp. pepper
- 1 tsp. horseradish
- 1 tsp. Worcestershire sauce
- 1 tsp. prepared mustard
- 1 8 oz. can tomato sauce
- 2 tbsp. minced onion
- 1 cup grated Mozzarella cheese
- 2 tbsp. snipped parsley
- 1/2 tsp. dried basil
- 1/4 tsp. dried oregano
- few pitted ripe olives

Start heating oven to 375°. Lightly toss beef with salt, pepper, horseradish, Worcestershire and mustard; press against sides and bottom of 9" pie plate. Spread tomato sauce over meat; then sprinkle with onions, cheese, parsley, basil, oregano, olives. Bake 20 minutes. Cut in wedges. Makes 4 to 6 servings.

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
