ACTON .

PIZZA HAMBURGER PIE

 1 1/2 tsp. salt ¼ Isp. pepper

t lb. ground beef

 1 tsp. horseradish 1 tsp. Worcestershire sauce 1 tsp. prepared mustard

1 8 oz. can tomato sauce

 2 tbsp. minced onion • 1 cup grated Mozzarella cheese

 2 tbsp. snipped parsley ½ tsp. dried basil

• • 1/4 tsp. dried oregano few pitted npe olives

Start heating oven to 375°. Lightly toss beef with salt, pep-

per, horseradish, Worchestshire and mustard: press against sides and bottom of 9" pie plate. Spread tomato sauce over meat; then sprinkle with onions, cheese, parsley, basil, oregano, olives. Bake 20 minutes. Cut in

wedges. Makes 4 to 6 servings.



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
