The game's bad news was the fact that John Jickling twisted his knee and may be lost to the team for the

season.

Back at Memorial Arena it was a seesaw game as Georgetown led 1-0, trailed 2-1, led 3-2 before Sean Guistini broke a 3-3 tie late in the game on a long shot from the blue line. Penalties hurt Burlington in this game as they took eight to Georgetown's three including a Match and Gross Misconduct as the game ended.

Our Peewees got goals from Brad Amato, Hills and Elinesky and assists from Smith, Elinesky, Lawrence, Lewis, Hills and Cull.

Georgetown now has a bye and will meet the winner of the Hub League and the Windsor-Chatham area starting the second week in March.
