And so It has been, and is now for the Georgetown Gemini as they at-tempt to "boldly go where no Gemini team has gone before."

The Gems are currently enmeshed in a quarter final playoff struggle with the Vaughan Raiders, as the first step in their attempt to claim a Central Junior B hockey league

championship.
If they should accomplish the task - and a difficult one it will be - it will mark the first time in the Gemini's 11-year history they have been able to advance past Central loop play.

In the 11 years of their existence, the Georgetown organization has had more than its share of ups and downs.

In their inaugural season, there was great cause for optimism to surround the newly-formed Georgetown Gemini.

Despite being a new entry, the Gems finished a phenomenal third in the Central league with a record of 19 wins, 14 losses, and three ties for 41 points.

In the opening round of the playoffs they upset Dixle, but then lost in a double round-robin series with Streetsville and Brampton, held to determine the league finalists.

Not bad for a new club.

The Gems continued to hold a certain degree of respectability the subsequent two seasons, finishing fifth in 1976-77 and sixth in 1977-78. However, they were eliminated in the first round of the playoffs both

From there, things started to go somewhat downhill.

In 1978-79, the same season the Streetsville Derbies went on to win the Sutherland Cup, the Gems finished a miserable 12th and missed the playoffs.

In the 1983-84 season, the Gemini finished a healthy fourth but were dispersed in the quarter-finals by Mimico.

In the 1984-85 and 1985-86 seasons, the Georgetown squad made the playoffs but were eliminated in the first round both years.

All of which brings us up to the present day. This year, the Gemini finished the regular schedule with a record of 19 wins, 15 losses and six ties, good for

44 points and fourth place in the eight-team loop.

That could be termed respectable.
However, anyone who was of the betting persuasion may want to take into account the team's record over

the last half of the season before placing any wagers. After reaching the midway point of the season, the Gems had a record of seven wins, 12 losses and two ties. Since that point they rolled to 12 wins, just three losses, and four ties.

But there's more ... Two of the Gems' losses in the second half of the season came on the last weekend of regular season play. On Feb. 13, Georgetown lost to Oakville 6-3 in a game that ultimate-

ly had no bearing on the final stan-The following night they lost to Burlington 8-3 in what was, in the true sense of the word, a "nothing


Anyone wanting to take a scientifle approach to predicting the for-tunes of the Georgetown Gemini in this year's post season play would certainly want to keep that in mind
