

Factory injury

An employee of William Neilson Co. Ltd. was taken to the hospital Friday after being pinched between a hydraulic case pushing machine and cases of milk, police said. Derek Edwardson, 27, suffered injuries to his hip at the 279 Guelph St. factory. He was treated and released from Georgetown and District Memorial Hospital.

Minor injuries

A Georgetown man and his Milton passenger received minor injuries Friday when his car crashed in a ditch on Sideroad 15. The accident began when their pick-up truck crossed the centre line on a curve where oncoming traffic was approaching. The driver of the pick-up braked and ended up in the ditch. The accident occured at 1:20 p.m. near the Third Line.

Stolen car

A stolen vehicle was recovered. Feb. 28 after being involved in an accident on Wilbur Street in Acton. The 1977 Oldsmobile was stolen from Wilbur Street and Mill Street the day before. After causing \$8,000 damage to a parked Camaro in a head-on collision the Oldsmobile was recovered on Main

The thief was not found by police. The Oldsmobile which was parked on Wilbur Street Feb. 27 was unlocked and had the keys inside, police sald.

Brake 'n' slide

A car stopped before making a turn onto Moore Park Crescent was hit from behind Saturday. The collision was at 6:45 p.m. and involved : Sheffleld man who was charged with being inattentive. Before hitting the car from behind the Sheffield man braked and slid sideways. The hit car slid 16 metres and received \$1,000 damage, police said. The Sheffield man's car received \$2,000 damage.

Wrong turn

A Milton woman driving a bus was charged with making an improper turn Feb. 23 after a collison on Guelph Street at Winston Churchill Boulevard in Norval. The bus attempted to make a right turn from the left turn lane, police said. Damage to the car was estimated

A 68-year-old Georgetown woman pressed the gas instead of the brake and accelerated into a pick-up truck parked in front of her, police said. Both vehicles were parked in front of the post office on Maple Avenue in Georgetown Feb. 24. The driver of the truck suffered minor injuries and his 1985 GMC received \$3,500 damage. The woman's car received an estimated \$4,000 damage.

The impaired driver was northbound on Main Stret in Georgetown Feb. 23 at 7:10 p.m. and was swerving into the south-bound lanes, police said. A collision occurred at Moore Park Crescent, even after the driver of a southbound vehicle attempted to avoid the impaired driver's vehi-cle. Damage to both vehicles totalied \$12,000.

Dangerous driver

Two Georgetown youths who tried to escape on motorbikes from police will appear in court this month where they face charges of dangerous driving. A 15-year-old and a 17-year-old were chased by police Friday at 8 p.m. on Delrex Boulevard between Rexway Drive and Jessop Court. Police began to follow the youths because they were driving on the wrong side of the road. The youths went through stop signs and around cars during the chase, policed said.

The Halton Children's Aid Society is asking for 8.9 per cent more, or \$1,012,174, from Halton Region this

This Regional Grant will help pay for the Society's 1987 operating budget which is running at \$5,261,614. The provincial budget guideline for the Society in 1967 is only four per cent. If this is rigidly imposed, then the Region would save

Why are they asking for more than four per cent? According to Society Director Ron Coupland, factors behind the increase include annualization of the 1986 salary settlement including provision for over-time pay, annualization of 2.1 staff positions required by the new Child and Family Services Act (1986), 1987 salary increases of 4.5 per cent plus merit, a 31 per cent increase in daily costs for boarding homes, increase in travel costs, maintenance or replacement costs for phones computers and photocoplers.

There's been a drop in the number of wards from outside Halton being accepted for foster care or adoption by the Society since 1985. This drop means a revenue decrease of \$60,000

The request for a \$14,500 Halton Regional grant for the Physically Handicapped Citizens Association of North Halton was turned down Saturday.


Members of the Region's Health and Social Services Committee met Saturday morning to hear arguments for money from three new agencies and from others wanting more than the four per cent increase allotted them by council.

Out of the appeals, only one ageney didn't get its request, and that was the Halton Social Planning Council. They wanted \$114,842, or 27 per cent more than they received in their 1986 Regional grant.

Receiving more than a four per cent increase were: Halton Big Brothers (\$476), Halton Adolescent Support Services (\$561). Nelson Youth Centres (\$3,000), Canadian Mental Health Association of Oakville (\$359), Milton Human Services Centre (\$1,400), and Oakville Crisis Centre (\$794).

The Decisions made by the Health and Social Services Committee go to Regional Council for final approval

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
