Dogs become 'eyes' for blind

NORVAL-Pinegrove Community Club met at the Hall Feb. 23 for their regular meeting. Spence Wilson asked secretary Prairie Bessey for the minutes, and then called on Brian Batstone, a member of the Hutonville Lions Club to introduce guest speaker James Astles.

The Lions District Governor spoke on Canine Vision, showing a true-to-life story on video. One of the main projects for Lions International is financing a Canine Vision School at Oakville's Kerr and Rebecca Streets. It is the only such school in Canada. There are 22 of them in the United States.

Mr. Astles said he was filling in for a young woman who, through multiple sclerosis, went blind three years ago and received a lead dog. Recently, her sight has returned, but with too much stress and not enough rest, her vision becomes blurred and she begins to see vertical lines. She had to decline the speaking engagement because of a heavy weekend at the school, including graduation exercises.

German Shepherds, Labradors and Retrievers are the breeds of dog used by Canine Vision. They are trying out other breeds also and find short haired dogs are more easily groomed. It takes 2 1/2 years to become a dog trainer, and Canine Vision has five paid trainers. It takes three to five months to train a dog and 28 days for the dog and master (the student) to become acquainted. Students live at the centre while taking the training. They are up at 7 a.m. and walk 8 to 10 miles daily with their dog.

Canine Vision has 31 dogs of different ages and in various stages of training, and are hoping to produce 120 dog teams a year. The school requires references from students to ensure dogs will not be abused. The Canadian National Institute for the Blind has a waiting list for trained dogs.

Puppies come from pedigree stock and are given to families to raise, from Canada's east coast to the west coast. These families raise the dogs to full growth before the dogs go to Oakville to begin their training.

Many tears are shed when the young children of the foster families have to part with their best friend, however, they are quickly reimbursed with another small cuddly puppy.

More work to stop flooding basements


More sanitary sewer construction work is being recommended for Duncan Drive in Georgetown. Regional Public Works Director Bob Moore wants to see \$181,700 in the 1987 sewer capital budget to cover remedial works on this street.

Last August, during a severe storm, two basements on Duncan Drive were flooded. The street has a history of basement floodings due to overloaded sanitary systems.

In September, again, another heavy rainstorm affected the Duncan Drive area.

Public works staff did a television inspection of the Duncan Drive sanitary sewer and found there was a high build up of calcium at pipe joints. That is an indication of excessive infiltration.

An uneven slope on the pipe, limiting its capacity and causing surcharging was also observed in the television inspection. These problems are why the public works director wants the Duncan Drive sanitary sewer replaced.



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
