'A few good people' needed for ball

The Georgetown Baseball Association is looking for "a few good people" needed to fill coaching and executive positions for the upcoming season.

The association conducted its opening registration sessions last month for rep players and later in March, they are holding four more registration nights, for both rep and house league players.

To this point, the rep team coaches include Boyd Hoddinott for the juveniles, Al Gardner for the midgets, and John Wright for the pee-wee team.

There are expected to be enough bantam-aged players for both minor and major teams, and the A team will be coached by Brian Hannah,

while the B team is to be coached by Mike Murdock.

GHA president Hal Ridley says they are still looking for a tyke coach, and hope to be able to fill the position within the next few weeks.

Gary Misener is the association's vice-president in charge of rep teams, and anyone interested in taking the helm for the tykes is asked to contact him, Ridley says.

"If we don't find one, we'll be in jeopardy of having to drop out of the COBA (Central Ontario Baseball Association) schedule for tyke," Ridley says. "But I'm very confident we'll find someone."

In the house league program, Ridley says they are seeking conveners for both tyke and pee-wee categories.

Ted Barrow is the vice-president in charge of house league play, and Al Jones is the convener of the t-ball category, while Jack Walanga will convene the squirt league.

Ridley says that anyone interested in taking over the convenership of either the tyke or pee-wee programs is invited to attend one of the registration nights where they can find out more about what the position entails.

The association will also be recruiting coaches for house league teams during the registration sessions this month.

The registration nights have been set up for March 10 and 12, and March 24 and 26, 7-9 p.m. each evening, at Holy Cross School.
