Gemini president takes positive look at season

The 1986-87 hockey season for the Georgetown Pontiac-Buick Gemini will probably go down in the books as "a good year that could have been

The Gems were knocked out of contention for the Central Junior B championship title after losing a quarterfinal series with the Vaughan Raiders four games to one. Most expected a little longer

season for Georgetown. "I was surprised we went out four to one," admits club president Dave Kentner. "I think, like everyone else in Georgetown, my personal hopes

There was certainly enough cause for Kentner and many others to have an optimistic outlook at the easet of the playoffs. After all, he points out, the Gems lost only three games in the last half of the regular schedule.

At the same time though, Kentner knew Vaughan was not going to be a pushover, by any stretch of the im-

"We were up against a hockey club with a lot of talent in their players. Their general manager did a good job of landing those players and (Rick) Tarasuk is a good coach. They could take Barrie, if they're

Kentner is pleased with the way the Gems performed in the playoff series despite the outcome. "Vaughan won the series, we didn't lose it. They took it away from us. We played some pretty good hockey in three of the four games we lost."

Through necessity, one hockey season, even at the Junior B level, runs into the next. And Kentner is already looking ahead to the next campaign.

Of course, the first order of business will be the forming of a new executive which will deal with the business of 1987-88. The club's annual meeting is scheduled for April I, at which time the executive positions will be determined.

"Next year's Junior B operation will be able to build on the errors of this season," Kentner says. "And we'll also build on the things we did

When he first ran for president of the Gemini last April, Kentner disclosed a three-year plan which is to culminate with a trip to the Sutherland Cup Junior B champion-

Gemint head coach Gary Hudson guided the team to a fourth place finish in the regular season this year, with a record of 19 wins, 17 losses and six ties.

"I'm pleased with the progress we've made to date," Kentner says. "We had hoped for a fourth or fifth place finish, and to do as well as we could in the playoffs."

As for as a coach and general manager for the upcoming season, Kentner says it will fall upon the vice-president of hockey operations to submit a recommendation to the board of directors on who should be made GM.

Then, with input of the GM, the vice-president would come up with a recommendation for who will be coach.

Two players, goalic Mike McNiven and centre/winger Wally Petrie will be too old for junior competition next season.

Other players are naturally expected to end their playing days in Georgetown when they make university and college commitments, and a select few will no doubt catch on with higher calibre clubs.

A major backer of the Gems this season was Georgetown Pontlac-Bulck, which is owned by Barry Whitworth. The contract is up for renewal for the second of three years May 1. Kentner estimates its total to be about \$45,000 over the three years, taking into consideration operating capital, and transportation and advertising provided by the corporate sponsor.

In short, Kentner feels the past season for the executive was spent "getting the feel of each other inside the organization." It was a season he feels will be valuable in determining the direction of the Gemini through the course of the next five to 10
