

Frustration greets McNally atoms in finals

Frustration sums up the feelings of the Georgetown McNally Construction "AA" Major Atoms after their first three games of the round robin Tri-County championship.

Outplaying the opposition in all three games, they could only come up with one of a possible six points, losing to Brampton 3-2 and 5-4 while tying Dundas 1-1.

In their opening game against Brampton, the McNally squad, who hadn't played in over two weeks fell behind 2-0 early in the second period as the layoff was evident.

Jimmy Kavanagh finally got Georgetown on the board midway through the middle stanza assisted by Derek Parsons to narrow the gap to 2-1.

Brampton regained the two goal cushion early in the third frame only to have Blaine McCauley waste no time blasting a Kavanagh pass behind the Brampton goalie with five minutes left to play.

Georgetown worked hard for the equalizer the rest of the game hemming Brampton in their own end for most of the last five minutes.

Coach Pirie was able to get goalie Josh Barber who had made several excellent saves, to the bench for an extra attacker but Brampton held on for the victory.

Two nights later at home Georgetown was looking for revenge as they hosted the same Brampton squad.

Defenceman Jeremy Hamp got Georgetown started early, scoring from the point two minutes into the game.

After Brampton tied the score on the power play Randy Bond finished off a nice three way passing play with Paul Kalbarski and McCauley to give the locals a 2-1 lead.

A minute and fourteen seconds later Todd Fuller took a Steve Boyle pass and fired a hard shot over the goalie's shoulder to the top corner

increasing the lead to 3-1.

Brampton fought back to even the score at 3-3 before the period ended.

Brampton scored the only goal of the second period to take a 4-3 lead into the final frame.

Just 39 seconds into the third period Fuller scored his second goal of the game converting a goal mouth pass from Boyle to tie the score at 4-4.

The winning goal was scored with one minute and fifty seconds left and Brampton enjoying a 5-4 man advantage.

Penalties hurt the McNally squad in this game as they took nine of the 12 minor penalties called.

Three of Brampton's five goals were scored on the power play.

Thursday, in Dundas against a team they haven't lost to in three

years, Georgetown outshot their host by better than 2-1 but could only come away with a 1-1 tie.

Bond scored his 20th goal of the season from Kalbarski and Ryan Pirie late in the second period.

The Major Atoms continued their round robin Tuesday at home to Oakville and this Thursday play in Stoney Creek.

The Trojans remain atop the standings with 32 points, followed closely by the Cougars with 31. The Capricorns are third with 28 points, while the Mustangs have 26.

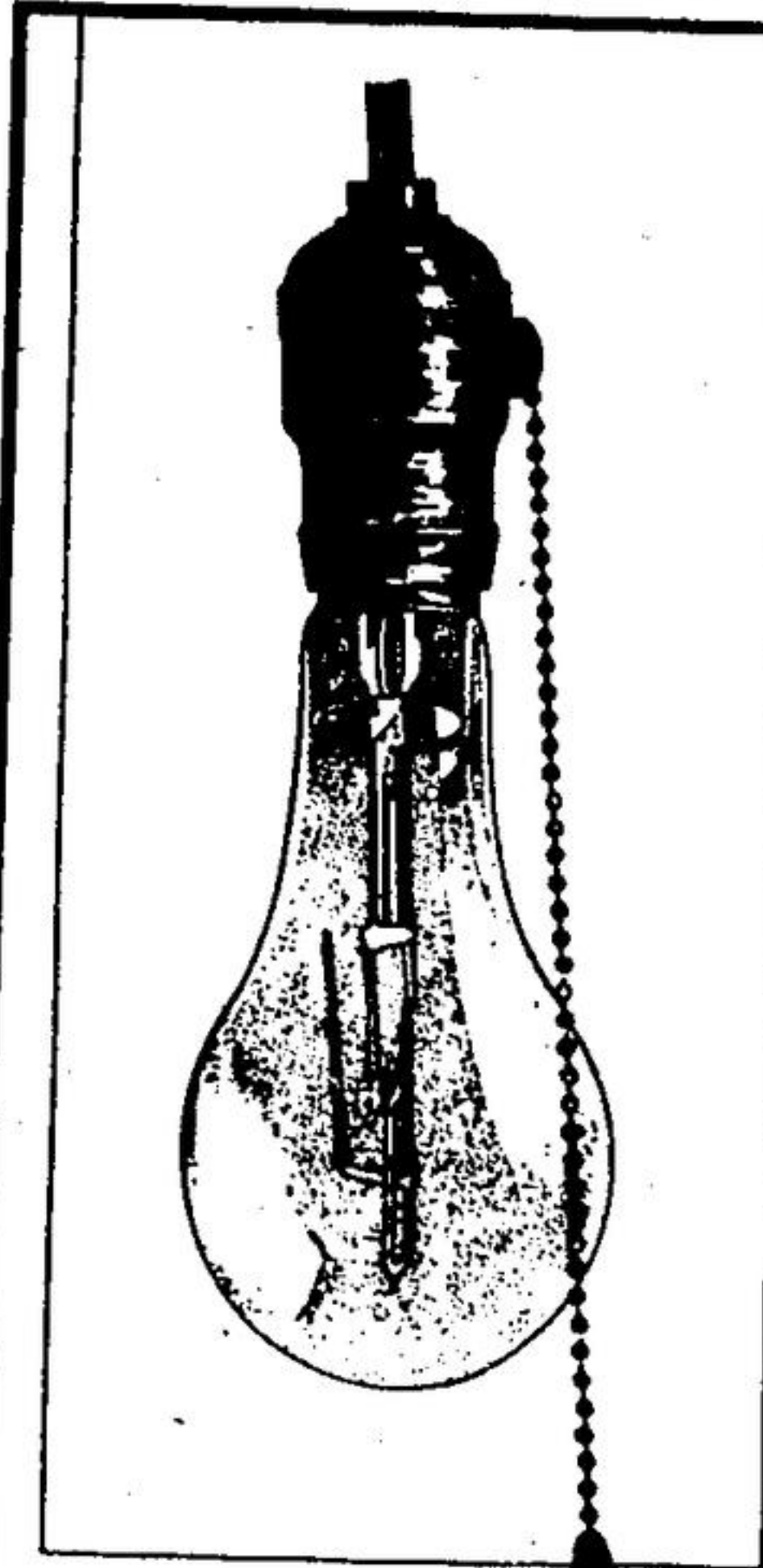
Anita Stankus led the Cougars in their victory with 21 points, while Kerry O'Neil chipped in with 12. Linda Robson had seven for the win-
