Not All Stamp Errors **Created By Accident**

Some of Canada's most sought-after stamps bear a hefty price tag because they are imperforate, when they should have perforations.

Many examples abound, going back almost to the beginning of Canadian stamps

"wartime issue" of 1942-3. If they were accidental imperfs, or errors, the high prices they command would be understandable. But they're not errors - they were purposely issued without perforations for

important persons. Let's use the classic 50-cent Bluenose stamp issued in 1929 as an example. A fine, never-used pair catalogues at \$550 and can be obtained for less. An imperf pair catalogues at nearly five times that amount: \$2,500.
