It may well be that the M and M Sports AA Bantams are looking at the Georgetown International Ban-tam Hockey Tournament as a chance to redeem themselves for what had been, up until last week, a disappointing season.

Whatever the case though, the local team has proven to be one of the pleasant surprises in the early going of the tournament, which got underway Saturday at the Alcott

After completing their regular hockey schedule with less than impressive numbers, M and M Sports came into the tournament and went undefeated in their first three games, to lock up first place in the four-team group and advance to the divisional playoffs.

Saturday morning, the locals romped to an easy 9-1 victory over West Hill, a team which was a late replacement for Agincourt.

The team has received solid leadership from Brent Presswood and Adam Bennet, and both have been putting the points on the board.

Presswood scored 10 goals in the three games, and added three assists, while Bennet has three goals and eight assists.

All three games for Georgetown were distinctly different in style. They waltzed to the win over West Hill, had to play catch-up against London after digging themselves a hole early on, and against Guelph, the team had to play a physical
