

## Shemin Nurseries claims consolation crown

The Shemin Nurseries Major Peeewe BB teams returned from Collingwood last weekend with the consolation championship title of the Huronia Peeewe Tournament.

The locals dropped their opening game of the tournament, but bounced back with a pair of victories to take the honor. In the consolation final they downed Cambridge 4-1.

### Rebels reap gold medals

The Ontario Winter Games, the showcase for athletes involved in winter-time activities such as skating, hockey, basketball, bowling and many others, became the window for the expertise of the five-pin bowlers from Georgetown.

The games, being held in the London area, had bowling teams from high schools which were champions in the following areas: North East, Chelmsford Composite; North West, Hillcrest High; Central East, Sir Wilfred Laurier; Central West, Georgetown DHS; South West, Chatham Kent; and East, Ecole Secondaire La Citadelle.

The local five-person team of lady Rebels, Sandy Weeks, Trina Bassett, Tracy Weeks, Traci Peggler and Julie McCorry, which is coached by Wendy Parent, captured their gold medals with determined outstanding play. To take the early lead, the first day, the team started with a three-game score of 3581, a 23 team average.

To consolidate their position the Georgetown girls, while playing against Chatham-Kent set a new record for a single game with a score of 1285, and amazing 257 average per bowler.

To further their accomplishments, Sandy Weeks, on the second day, rolled the tourney's high three consecutive game score of 938, a 316 average.

With the maximum points being eight per set, the local ladies scored 8-7-8-6-5-7-6-6-7 for a total of 67 with the second place team at only 47 and the third at 45.

On the third day in the medal play, Chatham-Kent won the bronze after losing to Ecole Secondaire La Citadelle of Cornwall, 7-1, 7-1.

In the gold medal play the East Region Champs continued with another 7-1 win against the local group from Georgetown.

However, the Rebels rebounded with a 6-2 win and showed their championship form by whitewashing the team from Cornwall 8-0.

During their stay, the Georgetown ladies appeared on television, took part in social activities, and were photographed for souvenir books.

A lifetime memorable occasion for all and a showcase for the Town of Georgetown. All statistics were provided by the proud parents, mainly Linda and Bob Weeks.

Shemin Nurseries opened the tournament against the hometown Collingwood squad, and got off to a shaky start, losing 7-0.

Georgetown regrouped for their second match against Brampton, which proved to be one of the most exciting games of the entire tournament.

Jeff Timmons and Craig Juby opened the scoring for Georgetown in the first frame, as Chad Hartman had two assists, and Greg Dawson and Brad Turr had one each.

Brampton came back to tie the game with a goal late in the first period, and another mid way through the third.

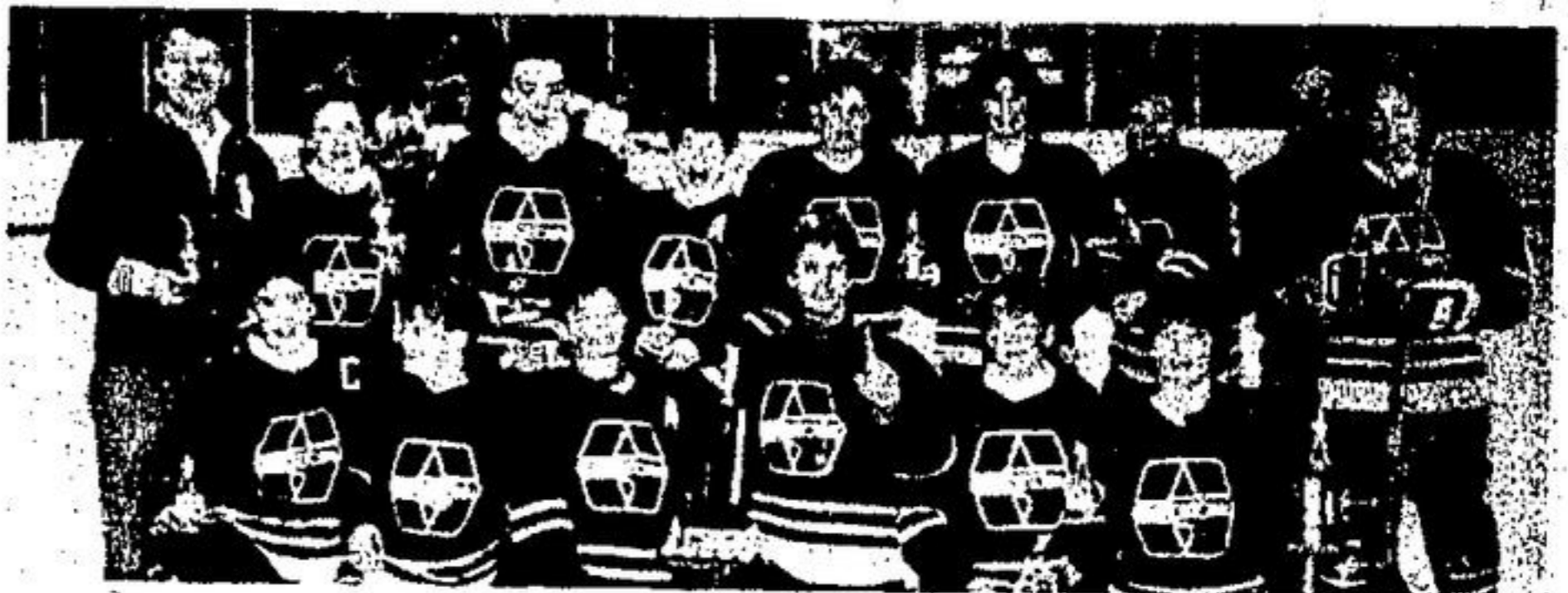
That set the stage for overtime and the tournament's format called for the teams to play without goaltenders in the extra period.

Tension mounted as both teams played fast, defensive, end-to-end hockey.

Jake Poustrup finally settled the matter as he scored from Claude Johnston to give Georgetown a 3-2 decision.

Georgetown then advanced to a berth in the Consolation Championship, where they met Cambridge.

Shemin Nurseries drew first blood, as Tutt scored a shorthanded goal on a breakaway, but Cambridge came back to tie the contest just 45 seconds later.

Tutt picked up a pair of assists in

the match, as Juby Foulstrup added one each. Goaltender Peter Downs even got into the scoring act, as he contributed one assist to the Georgetown cause.

Johnston, Downs, and Tutt were all honored as Most Valuable Players in the three matches.

The Shemin Nurseries team took part in the Friday evening parade,

held to kick off the tournament, and their coaches were complimented on the team's fine presentation and behavior in representing Georgetown.

Returning with the consolation title was all the more satisfying for the Shemin Nurseries team since they were competing against teams that were rated higher.
