ten unforgettable days.

As well as fouring the Egyptian Museum, visiting the great Sphinx and Pyramids of Giza, the group had the opportunity to ride a camel and travel down the Nile in a felucea. They also visited the tomb of Tutankhamen and watched belly dancers and snake charmers.

The music department at GDHS has undergone major changes, under the direction of its two dedicated teachers, Mrs.Blake and Mrs. Kirkup-Ortolan. As well as teaching classes at GDHS they devote much of their spare time to organizing and supervising many extra-curricular activities, such as bands, choirs, and trips. To help subsidize these activities, they also organize their own fundraising for the music department.

GDHS has five different bands and instrumental groups which students may choose to join. The Youth Band consists of 60 first year players. They had the opportunity to compete against many Toronto schools in the Kiwanis Music Festival where they won third place for their per-formance. Forty-five students play in the Wind Ensemble, and they received a mark of 81 in the festival.

The Stage Band is group of select musicians who play a variety of jazz and pop music. The band is comprised of a rhythm section, saxaphones, trumpets and trombones. Some songs they are currently working on are, Stompin at the Savey, Five Foot Two Eyes of Blue and Here's that Rainy Day. The music department also offers a brass quintet and clarinet quartet for students to play

The Jazz Choir is comprised of 16 selected students who were required to audition for the group. They perform vocal jazz music all on microphones and are accompanied by a thre-piece rhythm section consisting of keyboards, drums and bass. Their repertoire includes songs such as Satin Doll, When I Fall In Love, and Blue Skies. The Concert Choir is a group of 30 interested students who perform a variety of




