Life savers and safety preservers were honored at Jack Tanner's Table in Acton Friday night.

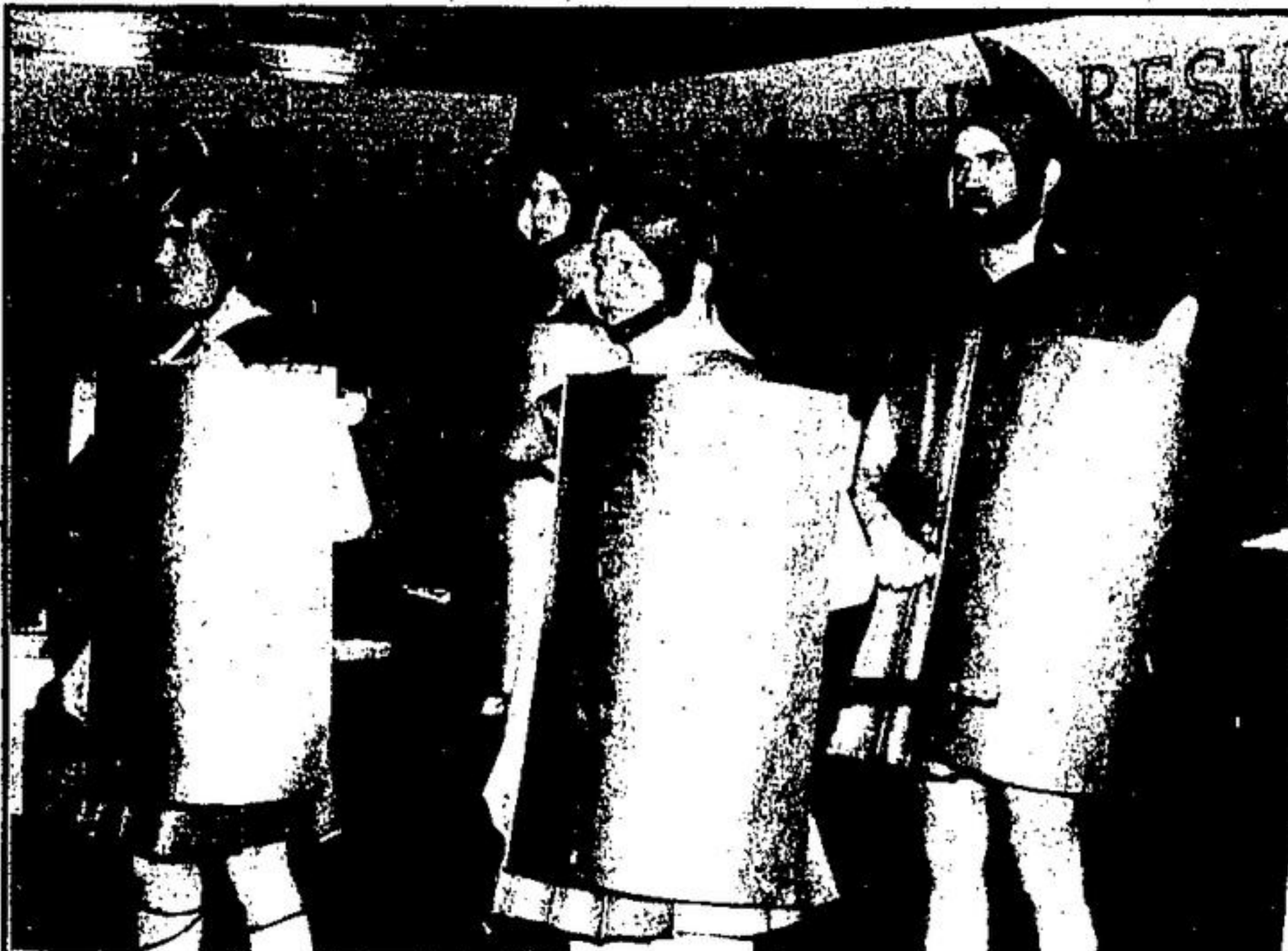
Old Man Winter alive n' kicking

Acton quarry could handle 15 million tonnes of waste

A minimal 15 million tonnes of garbage are slated to be dumped in an Acton quarry, if a proposal to transform an RR4 United Aggregates into a dump property is accepted.

That's what a waste management study, recently made public, states. Undertaken over the past year by Comcor Waste Management Consultants of Milton, the study proposes to rehabilitate part of the United Aggregates quarry lands into a landfill.
