Basement toys menace region-owned building

Plastic toys stored in the basement furnace room area at Maple Avenue Day Care Centre caught the eye of provincial inspectors recently.

They want those plastic and other toys stored away from the furnace.

The Ministry of the Attorney General inspectors also noticed the washing machine stand pipe was overflowing on the basement floor. They want the drainage corrected to prevent an electrical hazard of having the dryer and washer being in contact with water.

Thirdly, the inspectors noted smoke detectors in the furnace room and on the second floor weren't working, and that there weren't any smoke or heat detectors on the main floor and kitchen.

In general, however, the inspectors said they were pleased with the quality of services provided at 65 Maple Ave. in Georgetown.

The Region's Chief Administrative Officer, John Fleming responded this week to the inspectors' concerns at the day care centre.

He said there are some toys stored in the basement, but according to the Fire Department, they are within a safe area. The storage area should be kept clear of the furnace and this has been reinforced with the staff, Mr. Fleming said.

As to the water on the basement floor, a plumber has been out to fix the problem. Both the washer and dryer have been on platforms to be sure there isn't an electrical hazard.

Mr. Fleming said Maple Avenue staff were of the understanding that the basement smoke detector was working at the time of the visit.
