YBC junior boys' bowlers capture gold in nationals

The Provincial Final round of the Youth Bowling Council National Championships with four categories being contested by Georgetown bowlers, produced a first, second, third, and a fourth standing.

The steady bowling of Georgetown's YBC junior boys -1035, 1037, 1063 - placed the team first overall and made them recipients of gold medals.

After the second game, the locals were just one pin behind Rexdale, but their 3135 total was 34 pins better than Cornwall who passed Rexdale 3101 to 2988.

For the boys - David Ridley, Scott Smith, Robert Harrison, Ian Wilkes and Edward Doyle - the hard part is yet to come, meeting the best of all the provinces. However, coach

Ralph Miller says they will peak in time for the Nationals on May 2-4.

Miller has the added incentive of making the group of local coaches who have already produced National medals - Shirley Chaptin, Joan Ar-chibald, George Archibald and Wendy Parent.

The Georgetown bantam boys team were leading the eventual winners, Owen Sound, by two pins after two games by virtue of a 203 by Brady Chandler. But the 955 game of Owen Sound finally relegated the locals to silver medals.

This team from Georgetown was led to this achievement by coach Carolyn Lane with her charges being Brady Chandler, Joey Robichaud, Ryan Martin, Alain Larocque and Mark Reaume.

Brian Bell, the junior boys zone champion, was in the running after two games, but his 175 in the last game only gave him a 650 triple and the bronze award.

Tracy Weeks, the junior girls zone champ, after rushing back from her success as a team member of the Ontario Winter Games gold medal team, failed by two pins to gain another medal.
