Against the odds

"I share the conviction that vulnerable adults must be heard and that health and social services must respond to their needs...It is important to ensure that whatever system of advocacy we put in place will respond to the real needs of vulnerable adults. Advocacy must be structured so as to be effective and meaningful." This is taken from a statement by Ian Scott, Attorney General, to the Ontario legislature, December 16, 1986.

To this end the Review of Advocacy for Vulnerable Adults was set up. It is there to: Consider the need for advocacy for adults in institutional care settings as well as those adults that may require such services and are living in the community.

To analyse thoroughly the concept of advocacy in relation to disadvantaged adult populations in Ontario, e.g., elderly, physically handicapped, psychiatrically disabled.

To develop options concerning the establishment of advocacy services, including organizational structure and accountability for each option.

The consideration of need will include a detailed relationship to the co-ordination of advocacy with: existing case management and other delivery systems; and existing legal and volunteer advocacy services.

Drainage loan

Town councillors approved the request of John and Melania Digrolamo of RR2 Georgetown for a \$13,500 loan under the Tile Drainage Act.

The loan from the Ministry of Agriculture and Food is to be paid back over a 10-year period at a rate of 8 per cent.

The couple want the loan to finance draining of land at Lot 5, Con. 8.

What does all this mean? How does it affect you?

Have you or someone close to you ever received what appeared to be less than proper care from an institution (hospital, nursing home, etc.)? What were your rights while you were under the institution's care? Did you have any complaints? Do you have any suggestions? How would you improve the service? Did you feel that complaining would be of no use or would leave you more vulnerable?

All briefs submitted to the Review committee are confidential and will be used to design a system of patients' advocacy that would hopefully be set up in the future. What you forward to the Committee will not be used to pursue claims in individual

cases that happened in the past. The study is being done to hopefully prevent them from happening again in the future and provide advocacy, if it does.

Garden Gossip

Just can't wait to get out in that garden. I've seen some of you out there already, cleaning up, raking and I know some that have even started planting. If your soil is workable and dry enough to work on, yes you can plant some early vegetables now. Spinach, lettuce, radishes, peas and onions should all be okay. Hardy annuals can also be planted directly in the garden at this time with good results. Mark the plantings well or come the time they are showing everything else including weeds are also making an appearance and it is pretty difficult to identify those young flowers. Some varieties of potatoes can be planted now.

Mulch from gardens and the soil from hilled up roses can be removed a little at a time. Do this on a cloudy day so that the newly exposed plants will not get a sunburn. If you left seed heads on in the fall for the birds as I did, now is the time to remove them and do a general clean up, be careful not to walk on wet garden soil, each footstep compacts the soil making it hard for it to breathe and the plants to grow, this is especially true if the soil is heavy clay.

For those of you that enjoy the outdoors and walks in the woods, spring flowers are beginning to make their appearance and in line with this topic the Georgetown and District Horticultural Society will have Sandy Newton-Harrison speak and show slides of the wildflowers you can expect to find on those spring walks. Sandy is with the Halton Region Conservation and at this time they are very concerned about "Wetlands" and I am sure Sandy will give us a glimpse of the reason for that concern.

The Horticultural Society meetings are open to everyone and a warm welcome is extended to all. Meeting this coming Wednesday April 15 at 8 p.m. at Knox Presbyterian Church. I hope to see you then and next week on Garden Gossip.
