Clarification

The Herald wishes to clarify an article which appeared on page 2 of its April 8 edition.

Theft charge

A 27-year-old Georgetown man faces charges of theft under \$1,000 stemming from an incident at O'Tooles Roadhouse on Guelph Street on April 9. At approximately 11:45 p.m. a woman left a wallet containing \$743 in eash sitting on a bar stool. The wallet disappeared and the women reported the incident to police. The stolen property was recovered. The man will appear in court May 11.

Boat radios stolen

AM-FM radios went missing from eight boats stored at the Credit River Boat Company at 16 Adams St. in Norval between April 6-9. Police estimate the stolen radios to be worth a total of \$2,100 while another \$300 damage was caused to a tarp.
