'Steeldust' takes us back to the old west

The original horse named Steel Dust was one of the fastest sprinters in the history of Texas and is still recognized as a foundation sire of the American quarter horse.

For readers introduced to the Western novel by authors such as Owen Wister, Zane Gray and Max Brand the current crop of writers are frequently a disappointing

bunch. J.P.S. Brown, a fifth generation Arizonian is active in the cattle business and sur es horses to movie production companies. He knows whereof he speaks and his tale is about one horse who carried Steel Dust's good name.

It's an unassuming little book and turns out to be a throwback - an authentic, laconic and thoroughly

engaging example of the true breed.

It has all the essential ingredients, the cowboy heroes, the ciltified villains, rustlers, outlaws and those somewhere inbetween.

The love interest is played in a minor key while the hazards and rewards of life among cattle and horses occupies centre stage.

The imperatives of Arizona's semi-desert and the classic cattle drive from backdrop, structure, and motive force.

But the unifying theme for this story is found in the author's dedication - 'to a time not long past, but fast disappearing, when a man who "rode good horses" was usually a good man.'

The colt, Steeldust, captures the eye and heart of Bill Shane, back in Arizona after briefly abandoning ranching for a career on the battlefields of France in WW1.

Bill needs a stake to reclaim his heritage, the High Lonesome Ranch sold by the bank after his parents had died in the 'flu epidemic.

Acquiring Steeldust is his first step in this project and Steeldust is the spirit that holds him together on a desperate cattle drive out of drought-stricken Arizona.

Steeldust is the fourth book by J.P.S. Brown and I'm going hunting for the other three.

PS HOME POST SCRIPTS

If you have ever tried removing old, yucky, bathtub appliques, and have been as frustrated as I have at trying to get them off - I've found the trick!

Most of them will not move with ordinary household cleaners or solvents.

However, they can be softened with contact cement thinner, which is available from our local hardware stores.

The trick here is to heat the applique with a hair-dryer, which will soften the glue, and then it can be peeled up a bit.

Next, brush the contact cement thinner underneath to finish the job. Now, use the thinner to remove any adhesive that still remains on the tub.

I'll bet you think twice, before you reapply those little devils again!
