Most of the cameras in the store are of an autofocus variety ranging in price from \$100 to \$250.

The owner plans to "feel out the market" and talk to his customers to see if there will be more of a demand for the more complex Single Lens Reflex (SLR) cameras.

Works of art in the store will cost around \$40 to \$60 for a print.

Mr. Eagleson has lived in the area for about six years. A police officer in Toronto, he will share duties in the store with his helper Marie Lawson

Do you rent an automobile when you vacation in Florida? If this is the case, you should have your own personal automobile policy reviewed with your insurance broker/agent.

Without realizing they may already have coverage, many people still pay a charge of anywhere from \$5 to \$10 per day to reduce the collision deductible on a rental car. If you are planning an extended stay in Florida, you could save a substantial amount of money. Also, with a few of the less responsible rental agencies you may think you have purchased collison coverage where in reality none

This was the case a few years ago: A woman rented a car in Florida and was involved in an accident which was her fault. She discovered although she had purchased all the coverages offered, there was no collision insurance. The woman was held liable for the damage and ordered to pay over \$7,000 out of her own pocket! How many of us could afford to be held responsible for those amounts?

After discovering these problems many of the insurance com-

panies decided to offer coverage under their policies. Many companies now automatically read into their automobile policies an endorsement called the S.E.F 27. Some will cover up to \$15,000 for physical damage to a rental car and will cover the difference in collision deductibles.

For example, if you rent a car in Florida with at \$1,000 collision deductible your insurance policy might pick up the \$750 difference in the event of a claim. This eliminates the need to pay a charge to buy back the deductible.

Check with your insurance broker/agent about the S.E.F 27 endorsement. Not all companies have this in their policies and some charge an additional premium for it. Whether you travel or not, this coverage is worth looking into!

There will be belts, purses and hosiery as well in the future, she


The Georgetown native said she opened the shop because she wanted to "try it on my own". She is a former employee of Elizabeth's




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
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
