

Heart problems bring on ambulance crews

Georgetown ambulance attendants were called out to help a patient suffering from seizures during the week April 24 - May 1.

In total, there were 23 requests for assistance from the ambulance crews. One person was short of breath with a case of possible pneumonia while another suffered from heart problems and shortness of breath.

An urgent call went out to assist a

person who was given an electric shock.

Under the serious calls, a patient dislocated a hip while another suffered from lower back pain resulting from a fall. The crews responded to a call for help for a dislocated knee and a person who had fallen in the bathroom from a possible stroke.

One person required treatment for severe abdominal pain while another needed assistance for a

heart ailment. A hot water burn brought the ambulance attendants out as well as an emergency transfer to Toronto for a scan.

Less serious injuries to patients included a car accident victim with minor injuries and a patient who was returning for treatment to the hospital.

There were a total of nine requests for stand-by service at the outer boundaries of Halton Hills.
