Girls teams split with Oakville-Trafalgar

The Georgetown District High School blanked Oakville Trafalgar 2-0 in East Halton soccer action last Tuesday, improving their record to two wins, a loss and a tie in league play.

In the junior fixture, the Georgetown squad was not as successful as their senior counterparts, as they dropped a 4-1 decision to the

visiting OT team, for their first loss of the season.

The junior Rebels now have a record of two wins, a loss and a tie in league action.

Sheena Kewley, coach of the Georgetown seniors says her team has been playing with greater confidence, and has shown a better positional game.

"We moved the ball around well," she said of her team's performance Tuesday. "We didn't have the same gap in the middle. Before, our halfbacks were playing either too

far back or too far forward, but they filled in much better."

Kewley says she is now seeing the dividends of practices with the team, working on ball control. "The forwards have started backpassing to the halfbacks, and that showed up in the game Tuesday. They're playing with a little more confidence."

Originally, Kewley was expecting the game with OT to be a good indication of how the Rebels stacked up against a team of their own calibre. However, the visiting Oakville team was missing several of their players, and had to fill in

with juniors. Still, Kewley says she was more than satisfied with the overall play of her team.

Vicki Lavallee had to fill in for the Rebels' regular goalie, Mich McEachern, who was unable to play. Kewley says Lavallee played exceptionally well in recording the shutout.

In the scoring department, Lisa Mason and Sandy Itahn accounted for the Georgetown goals.

Mason's marker came late in the opening half when the OT goalie misplayed a free. Mason kicked up the loose ball and was left alone to casually deposit it in the net.

The Rebels have two games scheduled for this week. Yesterday (Tuesday) they hosted Loyola, while Thursday they travel to Oakville for a match with Queen Elizabeth Park.

Kewley said she expects to meet a strong opponent in QEP, a team that earlier in the season played to a draw with the powerhouse White Oaks squad.

But she says her strategy won't be anything out of the ordinary.

"I just want to do what we've been doing in practice," she says. "We've been shooting from better angles, and we're not wasting the ball down in the corners. The more shots we have, the better the percentage of scoring."

The senior Rebels will round out their season next Tuesday, when they host Burlington Central at the GDHS field.

The top team at the end of regular schedule play will go on to play at the Golden Horseshoe finals to decide who will advance to OFSAA. The top four teams make the playoffs in the East Halton playdowns.

In the junior fixture last Tuesday, the Rebels were unable to mount any serious threat against the visiting OT squad.

Julie Ross had the lone goal for Georgetown.

The junior Rebels were also scheduled to play Loyola Tuesday, and will take on QEP Thursday.

They round out their regular schedule at home next Tuesday when they host Bishop Reding.
