Junior bowlers cop silver at national championships

The Georgetown Bowl junior boys' team returned from Kitchener with silver medals last week, after competing at the Five-Pin National Bowling Championships.

Following preliminary action Sunday night, the Georgetown team was tied for first place with Alberta, based on one point for every win against other teams.

But on Monday, they had to beat Alberta three times to claim the gold medals, and came up just short, winning two games and losing one.

The team's coach Ralph Miller was exceptionally pleased with the showing of his boys, especially given the high calibre of competition they were facing.

"It was definitely a team effort all the way," he said. "They'd never been into this type of competition before, and they did exceptionally well. They never did give up."

The Georgetown team consists of David Ridley, Robert Harrison, Scott Smith, Ed Doyle, and Ian Wilkes.

What was particularly surprising about the team's finish was the fact that none of the bowlers had an average of over 200 going into the tournament.

But over the course of the event, they came out with a team average of just under 210 per bowler in 18 games bowled.

"They showed a lot of poise, and pulled together well as a team," Miller said. "I was very pleased with every one of them."

The team reached the national championship as the last leg in the Four Steps to Stardom of the Youth Bowling Congress.

They were chosen to represent Georgetown Bowl on the basis of their performances at the local alleys for flat scores.

They then proceeded to win the regional championships, and the provincial finals, before advancing to the national championships. The junior category takes in bowlers who are between the ages of 12 and 15-years-old.

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NOTICE TO PROPERTY OWNERS IN THE TOWN OF HALTON HILLS

THE ONTARIO WEED CONTROL ACT AS IT APPLIES TO PERSONS IN POSSESSION OF LAND WITHIN THE TOWN OF HALTON HILLS

Unless noxious weeds are destroyed by May 25th, 1987, and as often as necessary throughout the season to prevent the ripening of their seeds and dispersal of their pollen, the Town of Halton Hills may enter private property and destroy these weeds. The costs will be charged against the property owners and collected in the manner of municipal taxes.

Goatshead, thistles, cheery, poison ivy, ragweed, wild carrot, and milkweed are among the weeds considered noxious, and must be destroyed wherever found. Complaints regarding vandalism and golden rod will not be accepted as these are not considered noxious under the terms of The Weed Control Act.

Anonymous complaints will not be accepted.
