

Ambulance transports pregnant patient

A woman who went into premature labor was transferred to Peel Memorial Hospital last week by Georgetown Ambulance crews.

Crews had another very serious call last week when someone fell and caused a large laceration to their lower leg and head injuries.

The Ambulance responded to 13 serious calls. They included a patient with internal bleeding for a ruptured vein; three children emotionally upset from a car accident and their mother, who suffered a minor head injury; transfer of a two-year old suffering from seizures to Toronto's Hospital for Sick Children; a patient with back and neck injuries after his car rolled over; a patient who may have dislocated his elbow from a sport injury; an emergency transfer to Toronto General Hospital for a patient with something lodged in his throat; a patient who fell from a truck and may have broken his lower leg; a patient with a puncture on the bottom of his foot; someone experiencing trouble breathing; a patient with blurred vision and severe headache, dizziness caused by very low blood pressure.

Ambulance crews also handled non-urgent calls last week. They transferred a patient from Joseph Brant Hospital to Georgetown after treatment. They took a patient to hospital for a cut just below the eye, another patient for a large cut on his lower leg, and a third for severe abdominal pains.

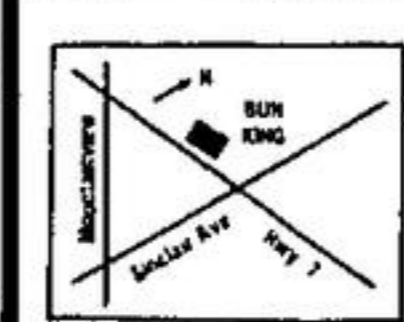

Stress on boating safety makes all the difference

Last year boating related deaths fell 45 per cent when compared to 1985 on waters patrolled by the Ontario Provincial Police.

"During 1986, 55 people died in boating incidents compared to 100 deaths the previous year. We attribute this dramatic decline to a marked change in the public's attitude about boating safety and improved boating," said O.P.P. Commissioner Archie Ferguson.

Part of this change in attitude can be attributed to the O.P.P. Marine Awareness Program. While the main thrust of this program is public education, 250 officers of the O.P.P. Marine Units will again be firm in dealing with violators this summer.

When on patrol, each of the O.P.P.'s 105 boats will be equipped with an alcohol breath tester (the same type as used in patrol cars) to determine if the operator of a boat has been consuming alcohol. Last year total of 29,671 boats were checked by the O.P.P. Marine Units.

This summer O.P.P. Marine officers will be on the lookout for unsafe boats, overloading, lack of

safety equipment such as life jackets, careless waterskiing and reckless boating.

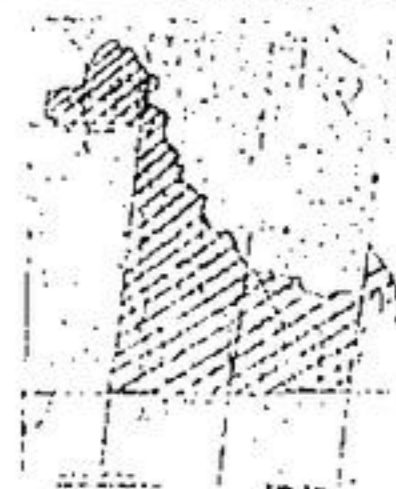

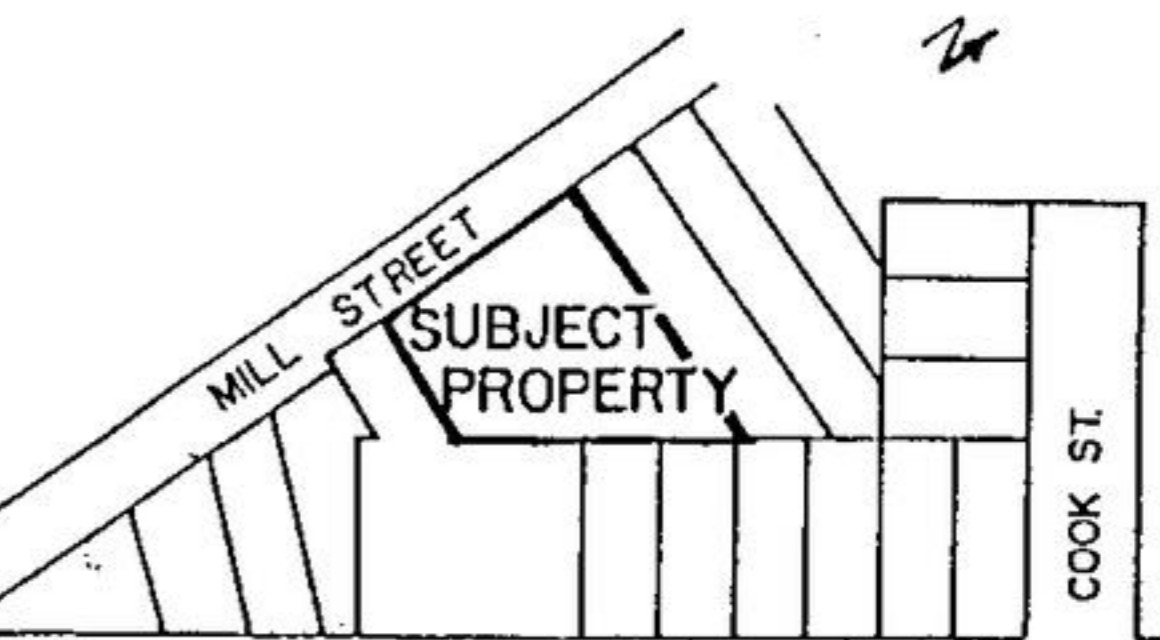
