

Property damage

Police laid charges on two youthful offenders for a property damage incident in February on Mountainview Road, Georgetown. The car window of a 1969 Plymouth was smashed with a rock and two fire extinguishers and a barrel of anti-freeze were emptied into a bus parked at the scene. A Mishiba radio was stolen from one of the buses. Damage to the car was estimated at \$75. The 14-year-olds are due to appear in court June 19.

Boat vandalized

A theft and damage to property occurred at the Credit River Boat Company in Norval between Wednesday and Friday last week. A plastic boat cover was slashed and a portable roof was stolen along with parts of interior cupboards. The stolen goods are worth about \$1,700 and damage was estimated at \$150.

Kicked in door

Police laid charges after a man, visiting his common law wife in hospital, kicked in a window pane of a door when he was asked by hospital staff to leave the premises. The damage occurred May 10 at 2:30 a.m.

Impaired driving

Police charged a man with impaired driving at 12:50 a.m. Sunday on Mill St., Acton. The driver of the car, a 37-year-old Mississauga man, pulled over to the side of the road and told the officer he was drunk. He is due to appear in court June 29.

Hit stop sign

Tools taken

Erratic driver

A man driving in an erratic manner at Highway 7 and Trafalgar Road on May 18 at 2:20 a.m. was charged with impaired driving. The 25-year-old will appear in court June 15.

No car plates

A 22-year-old Georgetown man was stopped by police at about 1 a.m. Saturday for having no licence plates on his car. The driver was later charged with impaired driving. He will appear in court June 28.

Police charged a man with impaired driving following an accident at 6:55 p.m. Thursday in which the driver of a car travelling south on 9th Line crossed to the east side of the road, hit the ditch and then struck a mailbox and Bell Telephone pole. The damage to the car, box and pole totalled about \$1,500.

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Council holds decision

Should the Canadian Yugoslav Cultural Association be given a special liquor license for two Sundays this summer? Town council put off making a decision Monday night. Coun. Rick Bonnette said council should wait until next week when the Mayor and Coun. Pam Sheldon will be present. The Mayor was attending a function in Acton, and Coun. Sheldon was on holidays and missed the council meeting. A letter from Association president Nick Cajic asks for a special liquor license on July 5 and Aug. 23. "If this is not possible, we would appreciate if you can advise us as to what steps we would have to take in order to obtain the license," the letter concludes.

Town deputy clerk Delmar French said the last time a liquor license was issued for the Association was four years ago. Noise problems with the Association property on Highway 25 have brought neighbors complaining to council, and discouraged the granting of further special liquor licenses. Mr. French said he tried to contact Mr. Cajic but only got an answering service. "I wanted to contact him to see if he had anything new to bring before council," Mr. French said. Coun. Peter Norton said he opposed the granting of a special liquor license to the Association and noted Mr. Cajic doesn't say what plans have been made for those two days to control the noise problem.

Scholarships available

Are you planning to attend university or community college in September 1987? If so, read on... The University Women's club, Georgetown branch, annually awards scholarships to high school students in either of these categories. Proceeds from the book sale, held annually in April, are used to fund these awards. Any five year student, male or female who is university-bound in

September 1987, may apply for a \$50 scholarship; and any four year female student who will attend community college or other post secondary educational institution, in September 1987, is eligible for a \$250 award. Application forms may be picked up at the Guidance Office of the Georgetown District High School, but must be filled out and returned before the end of May (this week).

Repair funds channeled

An extra \$35,500 was channeled towards road repairs at Halton Hills town council May 19. The town engineer's report had previously recommended delaying repairs to Sideroad 17 - Regional Road 12 and Tenth Line north of Sideroad 10 in order to save the money and stay within the town's \$165,000 budget for surface treatment in 1987 but councillors balked at that recommendation and instead, instructed town staff to find

the money in the 1987 budget to "preserve the integrity of the budget," according to Coun. Pam Sheldon. May 19 council adopted a resolution that would see \$10,000 drawn from the Ministry of Transportation and Communications supplementary allocation, \$43,000 from the capital reserve fund and \$32,500 from the contingency reserve fund to complete the surface treatment program.
