Another beer garden is being held July 18 and 19 by the Mississauga Sportsman Softball League at Hornby Park. The League is holding a baseball tournament on the two days and has council approval for the beer garden provided an anti-drinking and driving slogan be on display at all times.

Students clean rivers, streams

Rivers and streams in Halton Hills will get a scrubbing, thanks to a Ministry of the Environment summer employment program called SCARP.

Coun. Marilyn Serjeantson told councillors about the program which has students removing debris from water bodies and making an inventory of any flow obstructions.

She noted the Credit Valley Conservation Authority has never been involved in stream clean-ups because of the cost. The town should take advantage of the SCARP program, she encouraged.

Lots to do at Country Inn

Golf is just one of many attractions visitors will find when they visit the Halton Country Inn and Club, located just north of the Campbellville Road, near Milton.

Aside from the Par 36, nine-hole course, the Country Inn also boasts features of an Olympic-length outdoor swimming pool, expansive picnic grounds, tennis courts, and dining facilities to accommodate as many as 200 people.

The Halton Country Inn is currently owned by two families, who took over one year ago.

Brian Stojanov manages the facilities, and says some people are a little surprised when they visit the Country Inn for the first time.

"We're a little out of the way," he says. "But the people who come here for the first time tell us they really enjoy it."

The Inn is situated on property that, many years ago, was the site for a hog farm operation. But since those days there have been extensive renovations made, and the huge barn structure now contains a cozy lounge, large dining room, limited accommodations for anyone wishing to spend the night.

The golf course was added in 1963. Stojanov says they have been working at improving the course since they took it over.

"This year, the course is in good shape, and getting better," he says. "We've had some very good comments from people who have come back to play, and we're booking a number of tournaments. Our first priority right now is to bring the golf course up to a standard we can be proud of."

The golf membership at Halton Country Inn is "comfortable", according to Stojanov, and it's rare that golfers have to wait to get on the course, he says.

The Halton Country also serves as an ideal spot for company picnics through the summer.

"We're heavily booked on weekends through the summer," Stojanov says. "If a company wants to have a picnic or party, we can look after the arrangements."

Meals can be varied easily, with outdoor barbecue pits that are easily accessible, allowing people to bring their own meat for a barbecue. But there is also the option of having a sit-down meal in the large dining room, from steak and potatoes, to lobster.

The Inn will provide music for get-togethers, as well, using an impressive audio system.

Among the other plans that are in the works for the upcoming summer, are weekend dances at the Inn, and possibly pig roasts on the long weekends, if the interest warrants such events.

The Halton Country Inn is situated close to horseback riding facilities, and during the winter, cross country ski trails are open, which run into the adjoining conservation area lands.

Kelso Beach is a very short drive from the Inn, as well.

During the cold weather, Stojanov says they will be directing their attentions towards the interior of the Inn, and carrying on with renovations and improvements.

But for the summer, whether you're looking for a leisurely game of golf or to use any of the other facilities, the Halton Country Inn has a lot to offer.

The Halton Country Inn and Club is situated on the Sixth Line, north of the Campbellville Road.

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
