Road work gets provincial funding

Two of the five road construction programs for which Halton Hills town council requested supplemen-tary funding were approved by the Ministry of Transportation and Communications, council learned

Approved for funding to the tune of \$247,000 was construction of Sideroad 17 west from the Sixth Line to the Fifth Line and work on the Sideroad 17 - Fourth Line area.

Turned down by the Transportation Ministry were requests for fun-ding for Phase Three reconstruction of Sideroad 17, the Glen Williams Bridge deck waterproofing and

rehabilitation and the Tenth Line bank stabilization project in the area of Lot 25.

Council had previously allocated \$20,250 for further work on Sideroad 17 and work will continue on the pro-ject utilizing any excess funds from the other projects.

Council also voted to approve \$9,200 to pay for engineering expenses for the Main Street Bridge Deck rehabilitation project in Glen Williams. Some \$10,000 of previously approved money for the project will remain shelved until full funding is approved.

Work will also continue on the

Tenth Line Bank Stabilization project using \$30,000 council had previously set aside.
