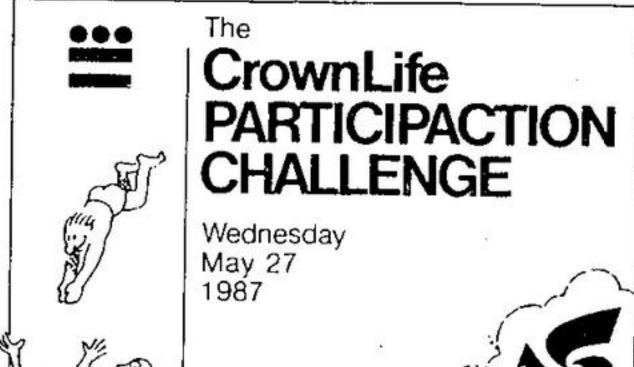

Mr Jones said he continues to try to provide "a very personal service" and he is active in the community as

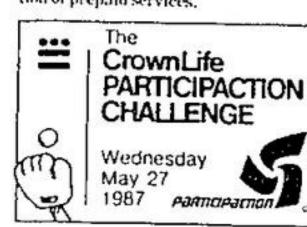
