

Firefighters hosting tourney

The Georgetown Volunteer Firefighters are preparing to host their second annual three-pitch softball tournament Saturday, June 13, in an effort to raise funds for the fight against muscular dystrophy.

Last year the event, held in conjunction with a raffle, raised over \$3,400, which was passed along to the Muscular Dystrophy Association, the charity organization of firefighters everywhere.

Local firefighters will be starting on this year's fundraising venture this weekend, June 4, 5, and 6, when they will be out selling raffle tickets on a patio set and other prizes, donated by local businesses.

The three-pitch tournament was a great success last year, according to this year's chairman Steve Terry. "It went over really well," Terry says. "Everyone said they enjoyed themselves, and all the teams, except for one are coming back this year."

The only team unable to make a return visit for the tournament is one that was entered by the Fire Marshal's office. Since the members of the team are spread throughout the province, they felt it would be too difficult to get the squad together.

Returning teams include Acton, Bolton, Erin, Fergus, Inglewood, Mono Mills, Milton, Georgetown, and retired Georgetown firefighters. Another team will be invited for the tournament to bring the state of teams up to a full complement of 10.

Inglewood is the defending champion of the tournament, while Acton won the consolation title last year. The teams will once again be playing for trophies to take back to their stationhouse.

Terry says they are hoping to raise more money this year, and a special incentive for the participating departments has been added which should help.

Each of the departments was issued raffle tickets to sell in their

respective community. The department that raises the greatest amount of money, per active member will win a gas barbecue.

Halton Hills Mayor Russ Miller is expected to be on hand to throw out the first pitch in the opening game which gets underway at 8 a.m. June 13.

The consolation final is scheduled for 7 p.m. that evening with the championship game to follow at about 8 p.m.
