A new project in Acton is being undertaken, in an effort to find ways the Halton Hills Department of Recreation and Parks can better serve the residents there.

Acton Citizens Taking Interest in Our Needs (ACTION) is a research project being conducted entirely in the community of Acton. Its purpose is to determine what programs and activities the recreation and parks department should be developing and offering to the citizens of Acton.

The need for ACTION was found because of dropping enrolment and concern with the opportunities available to Acton residents.

The department feels Acton deserves more attention, and an ef-

fort is being made to improve programming according to the desires of Acton residents. ACTION is designed to determine these needs.

Some people may already have been approached to help with the project. Surveys have been sent out through the mail and through students of local schools.

Residents are being asked to fill out these surveys and return them as indicated by the enclosed instructions.

ACTION has been made possible through a Challenge '87 Summer Employment Experience Development (SEED) grant through Employment and Immigration, Canada. Through the grant pro-

gram, the department has been able to hire a student, Cathy Lenz, to conduct this research.

Cathy is an Economics major at the University of Western Ontario, and a longtime resident of Halton Hills, and it is hoped she will become a familiar face in Acton.

More information and the results of the ACTION project will be disclosed in future releases.
