The Georgetown Peel Falcons settled for a 1-1 tie with Dixie last Tuesday, and then took a 2-1 decision over Malton Sunday in Under-21 soccer action.

The game played in Dixie was on a smaller pitch than the Falcons have been accustomed to, and since it was narrower, many well-intended defence-splitting balls became throw-ins.

The Dixie squad played fiercely, and were obviously reserve players for a senior team.

The Georgetown players watched in disgust as their goalkeeper Jay Corson was jumped by a Dixie player, who was subsequently ejected from the match.

Following a melee in the home penalty area, after numbers had been further reduced by ejections, Dixie was penalized, which led to a Colin Read goal from a spot kick.

Coch George Baines will undoubtedly be looking for cooler heads, and more constructional play in the games to come. While the defence has performed well under pressure, he will also be looking at serious shooting practices. But under the circumstances, he was pleased to come away with a tie.

The contest Sunday at Malton never generated the excitement the previous match had, but for the soccer purists, it was a better and more thoughtful game.

Malton's goal lived up to the game as they scored on a long shot, which was the type that can embarrass even experienced international keepers. The ball narrowly made its way inside the goalpost, when it could just as easily have been a goal kick.

The Falcons' goals, in contrast, came as a result of periods of sustained pressure, which could have brought more goals with sharper shooting.

The basis of this win was individual skills in all departments, and defence, in particular, was sound under pressure.

Coch Baines is pleased with the efforts of the so-called "marginal" players. The Falcons scored a goal in each half, with the winner coming in the final minutes when the Malton players seemed to tire. One-way traffic appeared to be the order of the day as keeper Corson was practically relinquished to the role of spectator.

Adam Djuk scored both goals, coming through well from midfield. Keith Spiller made a good recovery to his defence, and Doug Covert gave a good account of himself as a back.

Colin Mottershead was injured in the contest and left the field in considerable pain.

Howard Oram played an excellent game for the winners in "the engine room" midfield, distributing the ball well.

The match officials handled the game well and the players behaved accordingly.

A total of four games played by the team have produced few goals for or against the Falcons, suggesting they are good defensively, but need some sharp shooting up front.

Ways of the Woods camp

The Halton Region Conservation Authority is once again offering the "Ways of the Woods" summer day camp for children 8-12 years of age.

The first week of the program includes native studies such as archaeology, Indian games, songs and dances, archery, pottery and bead making as well as swimming and canoeing. This week also includes an overnight camp at Rattlesnake Point.

The second week of the program includes nature-oriented activities such as water, insect and owl studies, caving and bird watching. There is also a Parent's Night dur-

ing this week.

The base camp for the "Ways of the Woods" is the Mountsberg Wildlife Centre along with extensive use of the other conservation areas, which include Kelso, Mount Nemo, Rattlesnake, Point and Crawford Lake Indian Village and Conservation Centre.

Campers are picked up and dropped off by bus at designated locations throughout the Halton area. The cost is \$60/participant/week; 2nd child is \$55/participant/week.
