MPP's expenses up 33%

Expenses for Halton-Burlington MPP Don Knight went up 33 per cent in the past fiscal year, according to a report from the Office of the Legislature Monday.

Between March 1986 and March 1987. Mr. Knight spent \$10,274.85 on accommodation and travel, \$18,912.25 on legislative office expenses, and \$104,419.94 on constituency office expenses.

The biggest like in expenses claimed by the MP was for maintaining his constituency office. Last year. Mr. Knight claimed

\$58,109.52 in constituency office expenses. The average claim was \$104,822.37 according to the report. based on spending by the 125 MPPs

In the 1985-86 fiscal year, Mr. Knight claimed \$9,478.80 for accommodation and travel, and \$11,902.87 for maintaining his

New rules for midways

New Provincial regulations requiring the licensing of amusement ride owners and the registration of amusement rides came into effect Mon-

The new regulations, applying to mid-way rides, go-carts and waterslides, make the province responsible for the Inspection and licensing of amusement rides.

The regulations were prompted by several recent amusement ride accidents, including a 1985 Georgetown accident in which a man and his son fell 20 feet from a ferris wheel. The inability of the municipalities to carry out inspections and regulate

the operation of rides in their jurisdiction also prompted the introduction of the regulations. Since 1962, there have been 10 amusement ride deaths and at least six

serious go-cart accidents in Ontario, resulting in three deaths. The legislation to regulate amusement rides was first introduced by the government in December 1985.

The C.A.S. recognizes the con-

tributions of everyone involved in foster care. Linda and David Armstrong of Georgetown were approved as foster family in 1979.

This family received the outstanding service award for 1987. They have served in a variety of ways, including regular foster care,

operated receiving program. Additionally, Mrs. Armstrong is a volunteer for the agency in the young mother's program. Within their own family, they care

for four children. Additionally, they usually care for four foster children, making a total of eight children in their home on a daily basis. Both foster parents are intensively involved in the fostering experience. They partake in much of the agency

Proposed Region guidelines for servicing urban and rural areas met no resistance from town council

The guidelines deal with the provision of private sewage disposal facilities and wells in rural areas, and with sanitary sewage disposal and water services in urban areas. The report establishes nine exceptions to full services in urban areas

private roads and conditions for nonresidential uses on private services in rural areas. Industrial uses in rural areas now

The final area covered in the report is procedures for hydrological studies for develop-

ment of private services. Hydrological studies will be required before final approval is given to plans of subdivisions in hamlets and clusters.


